2010 Season Review

The West Virginia football program has shown consistency during Bill Stewart's head coaching tenure.

In 2010, the Mountaineers finished with a third straight nine-win season and posted a 5-2 mark in the BIG EAST.

However, Connecticut, Pitt and West Virginia finished with identical league marks and each claimed a piece of the league title.

That marked the sixth conference title won by West Virginia, most by any school in the league.

WVU earned its ninth straight bowl invitation, making a trip to the Champs Sports Bowl against NC State in Orlando, Fla.

West Virginia's nine victories came against Coastal Carolina, Marshall, Maryland, UNLV, USF, Cincinnati, Louisville, Pitt and Rutgers.

When summing up the Mountaineers' 2010 campaign success, it can be attributed to two things: the arm and leadership of sophomore quarterback Geno Smith and a physical, hardnosed defense.

Smith, the third different starting WVU quarterback in as many years, threw for almost 2,800 yards, completed almost 65 percent of his passes and tossed 24 touchdown strikes.

He was second in single-season pass completions and touchdown passes and fourth in total offense. His 24 touchdowns marked the third time in school history that a passer threw for 20 or more touchdowns in a season.

Senior running back Noel Devine finished his outstanding career as the school leader in all-purpose yardage (5,761), No. 3 in career rushing yards (4,315) and 31 total touchdowns.

Senior wide receiver Jock Sanders finished as the school's career reception leader with 206 catches for 1,980 yards and 14 touchdowns.

The defense was the only one in the nation to not give up more than 23 points in a single game the entire season.

It held its opponents to 13.5 points a game, third-best nationally and was third in total defense, giving up an average of 261.1 yards per game.

The Mountaineers were No. 2 nationally in rushing defense (86.5) and No. 11 in pass defense (174.6).

WVU was second in the nation in third-down

efficiency defense and sacks (45), No. 6 in most amount of three-and-outs and No. 26 in tackles for loss.

Eleven players were named to the all-BIG EAST teams, led by first-teamers defensive lineman Chris Neild, cornerback Keith Tandy and safety Robert Sands.

Five All-America honors were given to Mountaineer players, led by Sands, who was named a first-teamer by The Sporting News. Tandy was named a second team member on one team and a third-teamer on another, and Neild was named a third team honoree.

Devine, Sidney Glover, Brandon Hogan, Neild, Sanders and J.T. Thomas were invited to senior all-star games and Devine, Hogan, Neild, Sands, Sanders and Thomas also were invited to attend the NFL Scouting Combine.

Defensive coordinator Jeff Casteel was named the BIG EAST defensive coordinator of the year by rivals.com, coach Bill Kirelawich was named national defensive line coach of the year by FootballScoop and Mike Kerin was



named the football operations director of the year by FootballScoop.

West Virginia opened its season with three straight wins over Coastal Carolina (31-0), at Marshall (24-21 OT) and against Maryland (31-17).

WVU's shutout of the Chanticleers was the first blanking of an opponent since Cincinnati in 2005.

In his first career start, Smith completed 20-of-27 for 216 yards and two touchdowns. Devine ran for 111 yards and a touchdown and Sanders finished with eight catches for 71 yards and a touchdown to lead the team offensively.

In his first career start, Terence Garvin led WVU with 10 tackles, and Sands collected 1.5 tackles for loss.

Game two saw the Mountaineers hit the road for the annual "Friends of Coal Bowl" against instate opponent Marshall.

The Thundering Herd shut down the Mountaineers for the first three quarters. With its back against the wall down 21-6 at the beginning of the fourth quarter, Smith led West Virginia on a comeback for the ages.

The Herd had first and goal at the WVU sixyard line and was ready to put the final nail in the coffin, when Jorge Wright forced Marshall running back Tron Martinez to fumble.

West Virginia began its comeback with 8:28 left in the game, driving 96 yards in nine plays to cut the Thundering Herd lead to eight, 21-13, with 5:12 remaining.


After the defense held Marshall again, the offense started its final drive on the two-yard line and 3:09 left in the game.

Fifteen plays later, including a fourth down conversion, Smith found tight end Will Johnson running along the back of the end zone for the tying touchdown. Sanders caught the gametying two-point conversion to knot the game at 21-21 and send it into overtime.

Tyler Bitancurt hit a 20-yard field goal, and Marshall kicker Tyler Warner missed a 39-yard field goal to give WVU the victory.

Smith completed 32-of-45 passes for 316 yards and a touchdown, Devine ran for 112 yards and a touchdown and had 10 catches for 62 yards. Linebacker Najee Goode led WVU with 10 tackles, including two for loss.

The annual border war between Maryland and West Virginia didn't disappoint the home faithful as the Mountaineers came out early and



left no doubt.

Smith completed 19-of-29 passes for 268 yards and four touchdowns, Devine ran for 131 yards and Tavon Austin finished with seven catches for 106 yards and two touchdowns to lead the WVU offense. Stedman Bailey finished with four catches for 60 yards, including two touchdowns.

The defense had a stellar effort against the Terps, holding their ground game to minus-10 yards and the offense to 227 total yards. The Mountaineers collected eight sacks, nine tackles for loss, two forced fumbles and four pass breakups.

Newcomer Bruce Irvin led the WVU defense with three sacks, and Scooter Berry finished with two. Anthony Leonard led with eight tackles.

WVU returned to the road to face LSU, one of the top teams in the Southeastern Conference and the nation.

The Mountaineer defense grabbed two interceptions and held the Tigers to 230 total yards, including 80 passing yards,





Tyler Bitancurt hit a 20-yard field goal, and Marshall kicker Tyler Warner missed a 39-yard field goal to give WVU the victory.


Newcomer Bruce Irvin led the WVU defense with three sacks, and Scooter Berry finished with two. Anthony Leonard led with eight tackles.





Turn the clock back to the spring, a new offense had to be installed, and the defense had to replace eight starters off of one the school's best units. Josh Jenkins, a two-year starter on the offensive line, suffered a knee injury during the spring game and was out for the season.

Dana Holgorsen, who was brought to Morgantown in December 2010, to serve as offensive coordinator for a year, before becoming the head coach, took over the top post six months earlier than planned.

Taking over the reins of the Mountaineer football program was thrust on him in early

June, at one of the worst times. He had to organize a plan for the season, along with the responsibility of trying to heal a torn-apart fan base in less than two months.

Not one to make excuses, Holgorsen took on the challenge. He spread his philosophy that no one person was bigger than the team; and through hard work, dedication, teamwork and fulfilling your responsibility on and off the field, the West Virginia football program will continue to achieve success.

The Mountaineers started the season with a promising 3-0 start, and once again, adversity showed itself in each of those games.

In the Marshall contest, lightning caused several long delays and finally forced the game to be called in the fourth quarter, giving the Mountaineers the 34-13 victory.

Geno Smith completed 26 passes to nine different receivers for 249 yards and two touchdowns. Najee Goode finished with a game-high seven tackles.

In the third quarter, West Virginia had just taken a 27-13 lead off of Tavon Austin's 100-yard kickoff return, when the first delay occurred, halting play for three hours and three minutes. When play resumed, WVU held Marshall on three plays, and then marched down the field once again to increase its lead to 34-13. Lightening halted the game for a second





time, this time for one hour and 19 minutes, when the game was finally called at 10:24 p.m.

Norfolk State came to town for game two and showed that because they competed at the FCS level didn't mean they would be intimidated. The Spartans raced out to a 6-0 lead at the beginning of the second quarter and came back to hold a 12-10 lead at the half.

After a lackluster 143-yard halftime performance, West Virginia exploded in the second half for 45 points and 446 yards to win the game, 55-12. Smith had a stellar performance throwing for 371 yards and four touchdowns. Senior transfer Devon Brown collected 109 yards on four catches and Austin hauled in a team-high six passes for 82 yards and a touchdown. Ivan McCartney also finished with a score. Darwin Cook finished with a game-high 11 tackles, marking his first double-figure tackle performance of his career.

West Virginia travelled to Maryland for its first road test of the season in the annual border war. The Terps took the early 3-0 lead in the first quarter, before the Mountaineers ran off 24-straight points to take a commanding 24-3

lead in the second quarter. The highlight of the run was Terence Garvin's 37-yard interception return for a touchdown at the end of the first-quarter.

Even though Maryland came back with a touchdown with 2:32 left till the half, cutting its deficit to 14 points, WVU marched down the field and kicked a second field goal to stake a 17-point halftime lead.

Stedman Bailey caught a 34-yard touchdown pass from Smith to open the third quarter, giving WVU a 24-point lead and looked like it was going to cruise to an easy win. The Terps had other ideas as it ran off three straight touchdowns to cut the Mountaineer lead to three points, 34-31, and completely take the momentum.

A 14-play drive, eating up 5:47 on the clock led to the third Bitancurt field goal to stem the tide and force Maryland to go the length of the field in order to win the game. The Terps started their drive with 4:36 left in the game drove to the WVU 36, before Eain Smith saved the game with a timely interception.

The Mountaineers were paced by a trio of wide receivers who went down in the WVU record book, marking the first time three receivers finished with 100 or more yards. Austin finished with 11 catches for 122 yards, Bailey had eight catches for 113 yards and a touchdown and McCartney had 101 yards on eight catches. Smith completed 36 passes for 388 yards and a touchdown.

Three WVU defensive players collected double-figure tackles, Goode with 13, Pat Miller with 11 and Keith Tandy with 10.

Attention then turned to No. 2-ranked LSU as it was the Tigers turn to come to town, and ESPN GameDay came to Morgantown for the first time, making the atmosphere even more electric. The excitement of the Mountaineer faithful was at an all-time high as the sellout crowd waited all week for the game to kickoff.

Unfortunately, adversity paid a visit once again, as WVU knew it was going to have to play a superb game to unseat the highly-ranked Tigers. The Mountaineers posted 241 yards of total offense in the first half but was down 20 points because of costly mistakes.

LSU missed a field goal to start the third quarter, then six plays later, West Virginia cut the Tigers' lead to 13, when Smith completed a 12-yard strike to Tyler Urban. After the Mountaineer defense held LSU for two more drives, the offense drove down the field, keyed by a 72-yard pass play from Smith to Austin. Four plays later, WVU pulled within six points of LSU, when Dustin Garrison rushed in from one-yard out, cutting the LSU lead to 27-21 and clearly taking the momentum.

The Tigers took the momentum right back, as Morris Clairborne took the ensuing kickoff and raced 99 yards to the end zone, pushing the LSU lead to 13 points at the end of the third quarter. LSU scored twice more to put the game out of reach and hand WVU its first loss of the season.

West Virginia put up 533 yards of total offense against the vaunted Tiger defense. Smith completed a school record 38-of-65 passes for 463 yards and two touchdowns. Austin collected 11 catches for 187 yards, and Bailey finished with eight receptions for 115 yards and a touchdown. Garrison, in his first real action of the season, finished with 10 carries for 46 yards and a touchdown. Linebackers Doug Rigg and Goode paced the WVU defense with nine and



eight tackles, respectively.

The Mountaineers responded to the loss with two home wins, 55-10, over Bowling Green, and opened BIG EAST play with a 43-16 win over Connecticut.

Against Bowling Green, Garrison put up a career and national season high rushing total of 291 yards and two touchdowns, and Shawne Alston, in his first action of the season after coming back from a neck injury, finished with two touchdowns. Smith threw for three scores, and Bailey finished with a school-record third straight 100-yard plus receiving performance of the season.

Jewone Snow, in his first career start, finished with a team-high nine tackles. Tandy collected a game-high two interceptions and had two pass breakups.

Against Connecticut, the Mountaineers held a slim 10-9 halftime lead, once again being held in check, fumbling once, punting twice and losing a possession on downs.

With West Virginia holding a one-point lead in the third quarter, UConn was driving deep in WVU territory, when Pat Miller forced quarter-back Johnny McEntee to fumble the ball. The ball bounced to Snow, who rumbled down the field 83 yards to set up a Smith to Austin touchdown on the next play.


WVU put the game out of reach in the second half, outscoring the Huskies, 33-7, including a 23-0 advantage in the third quarter.

Smith put on a show, throwing for 450 yards and four touchdowns. Bailey added to his school record with his fourth 100-yard plus receiving effort, finishing with 178 yards on seven catches and scored two touchdowns. McCartney collected his career-high with 131 yards on six catches. Garrison ran for 80 yards and scored a touchdown.

The Mountaineer defense collected a season high five sacks, led by Bruce Irvin, who collected 1.5 for the game. Eain Smith and Cook led the team with eight tackles.

West Virginia travelled to Syracuse in week seven, looking to avenge last year's home loss to the Orange. In front of a national ESPN Friday night audience, the Mountaineers let adversity get the best of them on that night in a big way.

Syracuse came out the aggressor, blitzing the Mountaineers from the minute they got off



the bus. The Orange took an early 14-3 lead in the second quarter and looked like they were going to run away with it. The Mountaineers fought their way back, as Smith threw a pass down the sideline, and Bailey fought off a Syracuse defender to make the grab and run it into the end zone for the 64-yard score.

When it looked like the Mountaineers were gaining some momentum, Syracuse distanced themselves once again, when Dorian Graham took the ensuing kickoff and ran it 98 yards for a touchdown, giving them a 21-9 halftime lead.

The Mountaineers regrouped and scored out of halftime, cutting the Orange lead once again to five points, 21-16, on a one-yard run by Alston.

Three straight passing touchdowns from Ryan Nassib gave the Orange a 42-16 lead at the early part of the fourth quarter. WVU scored a late touchdown but dropped the game, by 26 points, 49-23, when the final horn sounded. Snow finished with a game-high eight tackles, including six solo stops.

Smith threw for 338 yards and two touchdowns, and Bailey ran his school-record 100-

yard plus receiving performances to five with his seven catch, 130 yard and one touchdown effort. Tandy and Eain Smith each contributed seven stops.

With its back against the wall and knowing it had to win to stay in the championship hunt, West Virginia hit the road for the second straight game to face a Rutgers squad that was hungry for a win against the Mountaineers.

Once again, as with each game so far, the Mountaineers faced adversity. A blizzard was spreading up the east coast with a wintry mix of freezing rain and snow that made the field conditions treacherous.

With those weather conditions, most would think that scoring would be at a premium. This game was like a track meet, both sides combining for 52 first half points.

Rutgers took the early 3-0 lead, before Alston broke through the line and like a bus with a set of winter treads, rumbled down the field for 52 yards to give WVU the 7-3 lead. Not to be outdone, the Scarlet Knights scored their first touchdown of the game three plays later to take a 10-7 lead. West Virginia gave its answer on the first play of the drive with Austin taking a reverse handoff 80 yards for a touchdown to give the Mountaineers a 14-10 advantage.

The scoring went back and forth once again with Rutgers' Mark Harrison making a 45-yard pass reception, before Alston rumbled in for a two-yard score, his second touchdown of the game, giving WVU a four-point lead, 21-17. Two Jawan Jamison touchdown runs gave the Scarlet Knights a 10-point halftime lead.

The Mountaineers fought adversity once again, outscoring Rutgers, 20-0 in the second half to win the game, 41-31. Smith's two touchdown passes to Bailey and Austin, and his first career rushing touchdown led WVU to the win.

Alston ran for a career-high 110 yards and two touchdowns, and Smith threw for 218 yards and two touchdowns. Cook collected his second double-figure tackle performance of his career with 11, Eain Smith and Snow each finished with eight tackles, Julian Miller had two fumble recoveries and Brodrick Jenkins had two interceptions in his first collegiate start.

West Virginia knew Louisville's visit was going to be a tough, hard-fought game, but was going to be a key contest for both teams in the conference championship battle.



The game started fast as both teams traded touchdowns three times to leave the game tied at 21-21 at the half. Mistakes were starting to cost West Virginia as a shanked punt with less than two minutes left in the first half gave Louisville field position that they took advantage of in tying the game.

The Mountaineers' mistakes continued throughout the third quarter with a missed field goal, a fumble that led to a Louisville field goal and a drive that ended on downs. Then WVU was attempting a 23-yard field goal at the beginning of the fourth quarter that was blocked and returned 82 yards for a touchdown to completely change the face of the game, giving the Cardinals a 10-point lead.

West Virginia once again fought adversity, stopping Louisville on its next drive and scoring with 8:53 left in the game on an Alston seven-yard run to pull within three points.

The Cardinals then sealed the game with a 13-play drive that ate up 7:11 on the clock and ended with a second Brown touchdown, giving Louisville a 10-point cushion once again with 1:42 left in the game. WVU scored a touchdown

with less than a minute left but it wasn't enough as Louisville won the game, 38-35.

Smith completed 31-of-44 passes for 410 yards and three touchdowns, and Bailey collected his sixth 100-yard receiving performance of the season, finishing with eight catches for 118 yards and two touchdowns. Austin had seven receptions for 90 yards and a touchdown, while Alston ran for two scores. Cook finished with a team-high 10 tackles, including six solo stops, and Bruce Irvin finished with two sacks and three tackles for loss.

It was down to a three-game season for WVU. The Mountaineers knew with two losses already that they had to run the table if they had any hopes of winning the league. Each game presented its own adversity that WVU had to overcome.

The Mountaineers travelled to Cincinnati for game 10. The Bearcats made their statement in their first drive, taking the early 7-0 lead in just three plays. Isaiah Pead burst through the line and ran 40 yards to the end zone. Four plays later, the Mountaineers answered with Smith once again finding one of his favorite targets, Bailey for a 59-yard scoring strike.

West Virginia controlled the second quarter, denting the scoreboard for 10 points to take a 17-7 halftime lead. Bitancurt nailed a 28-yard field goal, and Julian Miller recovered a Zach Collaros fumble in the end zone for a touchdown.

Cincinnati stormed back in the second half, scoring a touchdown at the end of the third quarter and one more at the beginning of the fourth to take a 21-17 lead with 13:20 left in the game.

Again the Mountaineers responded with a 12-play drive, taking a three-point lead, 24-21. Pass completions from Smith to Willie Milhouse of 24 yards, 13 to Bailey and 23 to Austin were the key plays in the drive to set up the one-yard Alston rush for the go-ahead score.

The Bearcats had one last drive with 2:01 left to pull out the win. Within three plays, Cincinnati was down to the WVU 21-yard line with a first down and things weren't looking good. The Mountaineer defense then responded, holding UC to seven yards on three plays and then sealed the win when Eain Smith shot up through the middle and blocked Tony Miliano's 31-yard field goal attempt with no time left.

Smith threw for 372 yards and a touchdown, Austin had a game-high nine catches for 126 yards and Bailey finished with 104 yards on six receptions and a touchdown. Goode had a team-high eight tackles, including five unassisted, three tackles for loss and a sack. Irvin finished with a sack, two tackles for loss, four solo tackles and forced a fumble. Julian Miller collected seven tackles, broke up a pass and recovered a fumble.

Pitt came to town for the annual Backyard Brawl and for Mountaineer senior night. Besides being a rivalry game, both teams had a lot riding on the outcome of the game.

WVU had its back against the wall from the start, giving up two touchdowns in the first quarter. The Mountaineers came back with a Smith to Bailey 63-yard pass play to cut the lead in half, only to give up another field goal to go into halftime down by 10 points.

The Panthers took advantage of a WVU fumble and added three points to their lead early in the second half, building a 13-point lead, 20-7. West Virginia responded on its next drive as Alston scored on an eight-yard run, cutting the



Pitt lead to six points.

Midway through the fourth quarter, the Mountaineers used an 11-play drive to eat up 83 yards to capture the lead with Alston barreling in from one-yard out to give WVU a slim 21-20 lead.

The Mountaineer defense dominated the Panther offense in their last two drives to seal the 21-20 victory. The Pitt offense was held to 23 yards on eight plays in the first drive, including a tackle for no gain by Julian Miller on second down and an Irvin sack of quarterback Tino Sunseri on third down. In their final drive, the Panthers were held to six yards on seven plays. The West Virginia defense sacked Sunseri the final three plays of the game, by Goode, Irvin and Julian Miller, forcing a fumble on the final play.

Smith completed 22-of-31 passes for 244 yards and a touchdown, Austin finished with 10 catches for 102 yards and Bailey finished with 80 yards on three catches and a touchdown. Garrison ran for 55 yards on 11 carries and Alston finished with 34 yards and two touchdowns. Garvin finished with a game-high 14 tackles, including nine unassisted, and Julian Miller collected 12 tackles, nine solo and tied the school record with four sacks. Irvin had two sacks, and Snow finished with one.

USF was all that stood between the Mountaineers and at least a share of the conference championship.

The Mountaineers took an early 10-0 lead midway through the second quarter after Pat Miller intercepted B.J. Daniels and returned it 52 yards for a touchdown. On its next drive, USF cut the WVU lead to three when a 20-yard pass from B.J. Daniels to Sterling Griffin that was ruled incomplete was overturned by the replay booth. A second field goal by WVU with 22 seconds left gave the Mountaineers a 13-7 halftime advantage.

West Virginia took a 10-point lead when Austin returned his second kickoff of the season 90 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter.

Then the momentum clearly swung in USF's favor as they scored 10 straight points to tie the game at 20-20. A USF field goal at the end of the third quarter and a Daniels rushing touchdown opened up the fourth quarter highlighted the Bulls scoring.

On the first play of West Virginia's next possession, JaQuez Jenkins stepped in front



of a Smith pass and returned the interception 24 yards for the go-ahead touchdown with just under 10 minutes left in the game.

The Mountaineers saw their chance of a BIG EAST title and the BCS bid withering away with that interception return. However, as they had done all season long, WVU fought the adversity beginning with its next drive. A fourth down completion to Bailey, then a fourth down personal foul penalty on USF before Garrison finished the drive with two straight runs for 21 yards, tying the game once again.

Then with 5:09 left in the game, USF started with outstanding field position after a 51-yard kickoff return. Three plays later, the Bulls had first down on the WVU 28-yard line and was looking like they were going to score the winning points.

Then luck struck for WVU as Goode stood Daniels up as he tried to run to the outside and forced him to fumble, giving the Mountaineers the ball back with three minutes left and the chance to win the game and the share of the championship.

Garrison rumbled for nine yards, then a completion to J.D. Woods for 10 more, then two more runs by Garrison for 3 and 10 yards. Then Smith was sacked followed by two incomplete passes. Next came the biggest play of the game as Smith found Bailey for 26 yards down to the 16 yard line with only seconds remaining. Bitancurt came on and calmly hit the gamewinning field goal from 28 yards to give West

Virginia its second-straight BIG EAST championship, sixth since 2003 and seventh overall.

Two days later, Cincinnati defeated Connecticut to provide a three-way tie for the conference title. West Virginia won the tie breaker and was awarded the BCS bid to face the ACC Champion, Clemson, in the Orange Bowl.

As had been the case in West Virginia's other BCS bowl games, no one in the nation except the state of West Virginia and a small percentage of Mountaineer fans gave WVU the vote of confidence to pull off an upset win against Clemson.

And to add adversity to the mix once again, starting safety Terence Garvin, one of the team's top defensive players, hurt his knee in the USF game, had surgery and was out for the bowl game. Dustin Garrison, the team's starting running back, injured his knee during the first practice in Miami and was out for the bowl game.

The game started out like a track meet. Both team's traded touchdowns and Clemson added a field goal to take a three-point lead at the end of the first quarter, 17-14. Austin scored the second of his bowl record four receiving touchdowns to start off the second quarter, giving the Mountaineers a 21-17 lead.

Then the game-changing play of the season happened. With Clemson on the WVU goal line ready to retake the lead, Andre Ellington was going down at the one-yard line, when Rigg stripped the ball away. Cook saw the ball out,

picked it up and raced down the field 99 yards for a touchdown, giving WVU a 28-17 lead.

That was a knockout punch to the head in the title fight, as the Mountaineer offense exploded from there en-route to a 70-33 victory, setting the all-time bowl record for points in a game.

West Virginia tied or set 18 WVU individual or team bowl records, 28 individual, team or combined Orange Bowl records, 18 BCS Bowl records and 14 overall NCAA Bowl records.

Smith threw for a bowl-record 407 yards and six touchdowns, ran another in for a bowl-record seven total touchdowns responsible for. Austin finished with bowl records for catches (12) and touchdowns (4). Alston ran for 77 yards and two touchdowns, Bailey finished with five catches for 82 yards and a touchdown and Milhouse finished with 71 yards on three catches and a touchdown. Eain Smith collected 13 tackles, including 12 solo stops and Irvin, Goode and Will Clarke each finished with a sack.

In the end West Virginia achieved its goal, including a championship season with 10 wins, captured their sixth BIG EAST title since 2003 and seventh overall, won the Orange Bowl to run its BCS record to 3-0 and was heralded as the top program in the East.

Holgorsen was named the first year coach of the year award winner by the Football Writers Association and was one of seven coaches to lead his program to a BCS game in his first year as a head coach and one of three who won the game.

Ten players earned All-BIG EAST honors, and three players were named to seven All-America teams. West Virginia was one of the only two schools in the nation to have a quarterback throw for 4,000 yards and have two receivers finish with 1,000 or more yards. Smith completed 346-of-526 passes for 4,385 yards and 31 touchdowns. Austin finished with a school-record 101 passes for 1,186 yards and eight touchdowns, while Bailey caught 72 passes for a school-record 1,279 yards and tied the school record with 12 touchdowns.

Smith tied or broke 34 school or conference game, season or career records, and the receiving corps tied for broke 12 game, season or career WVU or conference marks.

Goode led the Mountaineers with 87 tackles.

five sacks and 14 tackles for loss, while Cook finished with 85 tackles, including 51 solo stops. Irvin led the team with 8.5 sacks, 15 tackles for loss and three forced fumbles, while Julian Miller finished with six sacks and 11 tackles for loss. Tandy led the team with four interceptions and nine pass breakups.

Going into 2011, everyone talked about WVU football for the wrong reasons. By the end of the season, everyone was talking about the excitement surrounding the program and the promise of the Mountaineers' future.

2012 Season Review

West Virginia head coach Dana Holgorsen led the Mountaineer football program into uncharted territory in year two of his coaching tenure, beginning an affiliation as a new member of the Big 12 conference, one of the top leagues in the nation.

When the season ended, WVU had a 7-6 record, earning its 11th straight winning season and making its school record 11th straight bowl appearance.

Even though the final record wasn't what everyone associated with the program envisioned, the Mountaineers set numerous offensive records, had several players earn postseason honors and established a solid foundation in its new conference home.

When practice began in August, the expectations and buzz about the football program were at an all-time high. Nationally ranked No. 11, there was much excitement surrounding quarterback Geno Smith and receivers Tavon Austin and Stedman Bailey and how these players were going to lead the program into the new conference.

The Mountaineers started the season 5-0 and were ranked as high as No. 4 in one poll and No. 5 in the other.

Against Marshall in the "Friends of Coal Bowl", WVU exploded offensively, racing to a 34-10 halftime lead and never looked back,

scoring 69 points and cumulating 655 offensive yards, including 331 on the ground and 324 through the air, in the 69-34 win.

Smith completed 32-of-36 passes for 323 yards and four touchdowns, while Austin collected 10 receptions and a touchdown, Bailey finished with nine catches for 104 and two touchdowns and J.D. Woods had a personal-best seven receptions for 75 yards and a score. Running back Shawne Alston ran for a careerhigh 123 yards and two touchdowns, and senior linebacker Terence Garvin finished with 12 tackles, including a sack, two tackles for loss and forced a fumble.

In game two against James Madison at FedEx Field in Landover, Md., the Mountaineers picked up where they left off from game one, scoring on the first four possessions, leading 28-3 at halftime and never looking back, winning 42-12.

The offense put up stellar numbers, totaling 569 yards, including 448 yards passing. Smith was outstanding once again, completing 34-of-39 passes for 411 yards and five touchdowns. Bailey led the receiving corps with 13 catches for 173 yards and three touchdowns, while Austin had 11 receptions for 113 yards and a touchdown. This marked the first time since 1981 that two receivers finished with 10 or more catches in a game.





The defense collected four sacks and nine tackles for loss and had five pass breakups, led by Isaiah Bruce with nine tackles and two for loss.

By the time Maryland came to town, the Mountaineers had risen to No. 8/7 in the national rankings. The Terps came in with a game plan to slow the tempo in an attempt to shut down the high-scoring WVU offense.

West Virginia scored two touchdowns early, behind a Doug Rigg 51-yard fumble return and a 44-yard pass play from Smith to Austin. The Terps struck for 14 straight points to tie the game on two pass plays from Hills. However, the Maryland surge ended as the Mountaineers tacked on 10 points before the half and added a touchdown late to earn the win, 31-21.

September 29 was the red letter date in West Virginia football history as No. 25 Baylor came to town for the first-ever Big 12 Conference contest for the Mountaineers. The game didn't disappoint as an old fashioned shootout broke out and introduced WVU fans to Big 12 football in an explosive way. The game featured 133 combined points, more than 17 records

were broken and there were gaudy statistics on display for the nation to see in the 70-63 WVU victory.

The game featured great offensive performances from both sides, but none better than Smith's 656 yards passing and eight touchdowns. Smith's performance earned him the Walter Camp National Player of the Week honor and gave WVU its historic first win in the Big 12.

To go along with Smith's outstanding school-record totals, Bailey set WVU receiving marks with 303 yards and five touchdowns. Austin turned in a 215-yard receiving performance and two touchdowns, while Woods hauled in 13 catches for 114 yards.

Baylor was in on the record-setting, too, as quarterback Nick Florence passed for 581 yards and five scores, with a stadium-record 314 yards going to Terrance Williams. The combined points were a Big 12 and WVU record, while Baylor's 63 points were a stadium record. The teams combined for a stadium record of 1,507 yards (as West Virginia finished with 807 to Baylor's 700).





The next week featured another red letter date as West Virginia took to the road to play its first Big 12 Conference road contest. It was a perfect weather night, and the Mountaineers were battling the Texas Longhorns in one of the great stadiums in college football.

Andrew Buie turned in his best performance to date in a Mountaineer uniform, rushing for 207 yards and two scores, while registering three catches for 66 more yards. West Virginia's defense came up big when it needed to on several occasions, holding the Longhorns to field goal attempts on two drives, while making key fourth-quarter stops on third and fourth downs to thwart another Texas scoring threat.

After WVU closed the deficit to one, 28-27, at the half, the Longhorns extended that lead to 31-27 on the first possession of the third quarter on an Anthony Fera 38-yard field goal.

But the Mountaineers never flinched in front of the huge crowd and regained the lead, when Smith hit Bailey for a nine-yard touchdown pass. Just before the end of the third, Bergeron scored his fourth TD, giving the Longhorns a 38-34 lead.

Smith took control, directing two straight late scoring drives of 76 yards, as his offense was 5-for-5 on fourth-down conversions in the game. Buile rushed for 102 yards in the final two drives, and the Mountaineers opened up a 48-

38 lead and came away with a 48-45 victory.

The Mountaineers were the talk of the country, sitting 5-0 with a Top five national ranking in both polls, and Smith was the Heisman trophy front runner. It was the start of a great season.

Then the proverbial wheels fell off the cart, as WVU dropped its next five games. And with it, the unblemished record evened at 5-5.

First, the second straight trip to Texas proved disastrous, as Texas Tech dismantled WVU, 49-14. Red Raider quarterback Seth Doege threw for 499 yards, five touchdowns and hit 11 different receivers to give the home team control of the contest from start to finish.

Then conference leader Kansas State came to Morgantown and gave WVU much of the same as the previous week's result, downing the Mountaineers, 55-14.

Quarterback Collin Klein was responsible for seven touchdowns, and the senior's big night consisted of four rushing touchdowns and three passing. His favorite target, receiver Tyler Lockett, hauled in nine catches for 194 yards and two scores, as the Wildcats jumped out to a 24-0 lead, 31-7 halftime advantage and never looked back.

For West Virginia, Austin accounted for both TDs and 233 all-purpose yards. Karl Joseph and Bruce had nine tackles each for the WVU defense.


After an open week, the Mountaineers came into November feeling better about their improvement and were looking to end the losing skid against TCU.

However, the Horned Frogs erased a 10-point second half deficit and overcame several big plays from West Virginia to earn a 39-38 double-overtime victory. The Horned Frogs also overcame a late fourth-quarter punt return by Austin, a missed field goal in overtime, a seven-point deficit in the second overtime and then finally grabbed victory from the jaws of defeat with a gutsy two-point conversion on the game's final play.

The heartbreaking loss for WVU came on the heels of an improved defensive effort that held the Horned Frogs to just 4-of-17 on third down conversions and forced three TCU turnovers.

The game was tied at the 3:19 mark, when Austin returned a punt 76 yards for a touchdown. It was his first career punt return for a score, and seemed to be the game-winner,





when the WVU defense next forced TCU out on downs. But the Horned Frogs had one last possession, with just over two minutes to play, and made the most of it, when Boykin hit Boyce for a 94-yard touchdown pass with just 1:28 left.

WVU missed a field goal with 18 seconds left in regulation, but TCU returned the favor with a missed attempt in the first overtime. West Virginia's shot at the win ended, when Jason Verrett blocked Bitancurt's 29-yard field goal attempt.

In the second overtime, WVU struck on its first play, as Smith hit Bailey for a 25-yard touchdown. Not to be outdone, TCU scored on its first play with a reverse pass to Corey Fuller. TCU elected to go for two and got the win, when Boyce hauled in Boykin's pass just off the turf for the successful two-point conversion.

WVU's Austin finished with 101 receiving yards and 202 all-purpose yards to lead the Mountaineers. Shaq Petteway led the West Virginia defense 10 tackles.

The Mountaineers then travelled to Oklahoma State to face the Cowboys, Holgorsen's last coaching stop before coming to Morgantown. OSU used the big play and took advantage of West Virginia special team miscues en route to

a 55-34 victory

Bailey led the Mountaineers with 14 passes for 225 yards, and Smith finished with 364 yards passing. Pat Miller, Jorge Wright and Bruce led the WVU defense with a combined 16 tackles, one sack and three TFLs.

West Virginia looked to break the four-game losing skid, as perennial Big 12-power Oklahoma came to town. In an entertaining backand-forth game, highlighted by one of the best individual performances in WVU football history, the Sooners made one more play count, defeating the Mountaineers, 50-49.

Austin played tailback for the first time since high school and responded with a WVU record 344-rushing yards, coupled with 82 yards receiving and 146 on kickoff returns, and ending his night with an impressive 572 all-purpose yards. Aside from the school single-game rushing mark, Austin's all-purpose yards were the most in school and Big 12 history, and the most in college football in 2012. It was second most in NCAA history, as he fell just six yards shy of the record.

With his two rushing touchdowns in the game, Austin became the first Mountaineer in school history to score a touchdown four different ways in a season (receiving, rushing, punt and kickoff return).

Austin got offensive help from Bailey, who had 13 catches for 205 yards and four touchdowns. It was Bailey's second straight 200-yard receiving effort, and it came with the help of Smith's 320-yard passing day against the Sooners.

West Virginia had two games left and was looking to win out to help their bowl chances. First up was a Thanksgiving weekend game at lowa State.

The return of a healthy Alston certainly helped the Mountaineer cause, as a running game was established behind his 130 yards rushing and one touchdown. Alston averaged 6.8 yards per carry, and his powerful running allowed Smith to have more options.

A strong wind plagued both teams for the entire game, but West Virginia was able to use the wind to its advantage, taking a 10-0 lead before lowa State got on the board.

The Mountaineers built a 17-14 halftime lead, only to see the Cyclones take a 21-20 lead in the third quarter. Austin took charge and gave the Mountaineers the lead once again,

taking a flip pass from Smith and racing 75 yards for the winning score.

The Cyclones would threaten again, and reached the West Virginia seven-yard line, but safety Cook forced a fumble, that was recovered by Karl Joseph in the end zone to preserve the Mountaineer victory.

Aside from Alston's big day, Smith finished with 236 yards passing and two scores. Austin came in with six catches for 99 yards, along with 74-yards rushing for a total of 261 all-purpose yards. Joseph led the defense with 13 stops.

West Virginia closed the 2012 regular season in impressive fashion with a 59-10 victory over Kansas on senior day. The seventh win of the season came on the heels of yet another strong performance by Smith. Playing in his final game at Milan Puskar Stadium, Smith was near perfect, completing 23-of-24 passes for 407 yards and three touchdowns. After a first-half interception, Smith completed 21 straight passes, which set the WVU consecutive pass completion mark, breaking the old record of 14 that he set earlier in the season. Also, his completion percentage of 95.8 percent tied the



NCAA record (min. 20 attempts).

His usual targets came through for him once again. Receiver Stedman Bailey caught 11 passes for 159 yards and two scores, while Tavon Austin had four catches for 110 yards, along with 77 rushing yards. With his 187 all-purpose yards, Austin broke his own mark from 2011 and set the single-season school record for that category.


The Mountaineers started strong, taking a 21-0 advantage in the second quarter, and never looked back. West Virginia put up 17 more points in the third quarter, en route to the 59-10 victory.

Aside from WVU's fine offensive day, Joseph led the defense with seven tackles and one interception and Cook and Petteway combined for 14 tackles.

West Virginia finished its season in its school record 11th straight bowl game, facing former Big East rival Syracuse in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium.

Playing through wintry conditions with a strong wind and snow, the Orange used a powerful ground game that produced 369 rushing yards, and their defense took advantage of the





slippery conditions to slow the Mountaineers' sixth-ranked passing attack in a 38-14 win.

Both West Virginia touchdowns were produced by Bailey, who broke free on a screen pass for a 32-yard TD in the second quarter and then beat a Syracuse defender down the sideline for a 29-yard touchdown third quarter.

The loss represented a disappointing ending to the fabulous careers of Smith, Bailey and Austin.

Austin and Bailey were named to the All-Big 12 Conference First Team as receivers and Austin as a return specialist. Smith and Madsen were second-team selections. Austin and Bailey earned spots on numerous All-America teams, and Joseph and Bruce were named to several freshman All-American teams.

Austin was named the Big 12 Special Teams Co-Player of the Year, the recipient of the Paul Hornung Award for the nation's most versatile player and the Jet Award honoree for the top return man in college football. Bailey was named a finalist for the Fred Biletnikoff Award, for the top receiver in college football, and Smith was a finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award and the Manning Award.

This talented group will go down as the best trio of offensive players in West Virginia University history, tying or setting 55 game, season and career records.

2013 Season Review

Three words that come to mind when summing up the 2013 West Virginia football season were inexperience, inconsistency and injuries, and the Mountaineers had plenty of each, resulting in a 4-8 record and tying for seventh place in the second year of Big 12 competition.

That mark halted a streak of 11 straight winning seasons and bowl appearances that included three 11-win seasons, a 10-win season, four nine-win seasons, six conference championships and three BCS bowl wins.

Heading into 2013, the offense faced the heaviest losses, missing three top-three round NFL draft choices, two of them All-Americans. Quarterback Geno Smith and receivers Tavon Austin and Stedman Bailey were headliners and record setters. Three starters on the interior offensive line were gone and so was running back Shawn Alston.

Not having enough game experience and inconsistency played a role in the offensive misfortunes, and the team could never put back-to-back winning performances together. Three quarterbacks and a plethora of receivers were used throughout the season but the right mix never emerged.

The defense returned most of its starters from the year before, but was still young and didn't have enough depth. It showed

improvement, but as the unending injuries mounted, so did opponents' output

On special teams, the kicker and punter had to be replaced and so did the return positions. While the coverage, field goal and punt units were improved, the return never got on track.

A tough slate of nationally ranked teams awaited the Mountaineers, and at one point, five of six teams WVU faced came into the game with an unblemished record.

One thing that Dana Holgorsen and his staff never questioned was player effort, as they continued to play hard. Even though the record didn't reflect it, there were bright spots during the season.

Wanting to step up a level and play in one of the premier conferences, Charles Sims transferred to West Virginia after three all-conference seasons at Houston and gave the Mountaineer running game a lift. He was named Big 12 Newcomer of the Year after posting 1,549 all-purpose yards, 1,095 yards and 11 touchdowns on the ground and 45 catches for 401 yards and three touchdowns receiving. He was WVU's first 1,000-yard rusher since Noel Devine ran for 1,465 in 2009. The All-Big 12 Conference first-team performer finished No. 2 in the Big 12 in all-purpose yards and scoring touchdowns and was No. 3 in rushing yards.





Junior college transfer Dreamius Smith ran for 494 yards on 103 carries and scored five touchdowns, while freshman Wendell Smallwood showed promise, averaging 5.7 yards per rush and scored a touchdown.

Defensive lineman Will Clarke added All-Big 12 Conference second-team honors to close out his career. He finished with 49 tackles, including 36 unassisted, six sacks, 17 tackles for loss and three pass breakups. He was No. 3 in the Big 12 in tackles for loss and No. 7 in sacks.

Safety Darwin Cook also was selected to the conference's second team. He led the Mountaineers in interceptions with four, had two fumble recoveries and was second in tackles with 74, including a team-leading 55 solo stops.

Punter Nick O'Toole, a newcomer in 2013, earned All-Big 12 Conference second-team honors. He finished with a 44.1 yards per punt average, placed 22 punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line, hit 26 kicks of 50 yards or more and had 23 punts that resulted in a fair catch.

Offensive lineman Quinton Spain was a second-team selection on several Big 12 lists, as was linebacker Nick Kwiatkoski, the Mountaineers' leading tackler with 86 stops,

including 54 solo tackles, two sacks, two forced fumbles and 6.5 tackles for loss. Linebacker Brandon Golson, also a first-year player, finished with a team-leading five forced fumbles to lead the Big 12, four sacks, seven tackles for loss and tallied 41 tackles.

Safety Karl Joseph earned All-Big 12 Conference honorable-mention accolades after finishing with 68 tackles, including 56 solo stops, three tackles for loss, four fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and four pass breakups. Linebacker Jared Barber had 71 tackles, including five for loss, while defensive end Kyle Rose finished with 49 tackles, including a sack, 8.5 tackles for loss and had a fumble recovery.

Freshman receiver Daikiel Shorts showed promise, tying Sims for the team lead with 45 catches, to go with 495 yards and two touchdowns, Kevin White led the receiving corps with five touchdowns and Mario Alford came on strong late, averaging 20.4 yards per catch, with 552 yards and two touchdowns.

The Mountaineers started the season winning two of its first three games over William & Mary (24-17) and Georgia State (41-7). Against William & Mary, Paul Millard completed 19-of-25 for 237 yards and a touchdown in his first collegiate start, Sims ran for 120 yards in his first game at WVU, and Shorts finished with a team-high seven catches for 63 yards, but the Mountaineers needed 17 second-half points to beat the Tribe after being down by 10 at halftime.

Sandwiched between the two wins was the Big 12 Conference opening game at Oklahoma. A 75-yard run by Smith gave the Mountaineers the early lead, but it was short-lived, as the Sooners used a 316-yard rushing attack and 16 straight points to lead them to the victory. White finished with a game-high seven catches for 80 yards.


Ford Childress saw his first action as the starting signal caller against Georgia State, completing 25-of-41 passes for 359 yards and three touchdowns. Sims once again was strong for the Mountaineers with 116 yards on 18 carries and a touchdown. KJ Myers led all receivers with six catches for 64 yards, and Shorts collected 88 yards receiving. Unfortunately, Childress' season ended the next week, as he sustained a season-ending arm

injury in a shutout loss against Maryland.

Then came the emergence of Clint Trickett for the conference home opener against Big 12 preseason favorite, Oklahoma State. Even though his shoulder was injured before half, Trickett finished the game, completing 24-of-50 passes for 309 yards and a touchdown to lead the Mountaineers to a 30-21 upset of then No. 11-ranked OSU.

Sims finished with 60 yards rushing and a touchdown and had five catches for 82 yards. Ronald Carswell and Shorts contributed five catches each. The Mountaineer defense forced three turnovers, including two interceptions, had nine tackles for loss and 10 pass breakups. Jared Barber led the WVU defense with nine tackles and Travis Bell and Cook each contributed eight tackles. Golson finished with a sack, two tackles for loss and a forced fumble and Ishmael Banks turned an interception into a 58-yard touchdown return.

Sitting at 3-2, the Mountaineers traveled to Waco, Texas, to face Baylor. The Bears put a





decisive victory together that night to proclaim their stake as a dominant team not only in the Big 12 but in the nation. The Mountaineer defense finished with four turnovers, including three interceptions. Barber registered a gamehigh 11 tackles, and Cook finished with nine solo tackles, including a sack, an interception and took a lateral from a Bell interception and returned it 32 yards for a touchdown.

The Mountaineers came home to face Texas Tech, but a big Red Raider second-half comeback spoiled Homecoming, 37-27.

Trailing 13-0, West Virginia came to life in the second quarter, scoring 20 straight points, taking a 20-13 lead, on a Smith 38-yard run, a four-yard pass from Trickett to Sims and two Lambert field goals. After a third Texas Tech field goal cut the WVU lead to four in the middle of the third quarter, Smith scored his second touchdown of the game on a 12-yard run, giving the Mountaineers' an 11-point lead with 4:36 left in the third quarter.

The Red Raiders then put the stranglehold on the Mountaineer offense, holding it scoreless the rest of the way to take the victory. Two rushing touchdowns and a touchdown reception gave Tech the 10-point come-from-behind victory.

WVU headed to Manhattan, Kan., to try to turn its fortunes around, but once again, the early lead enjoyed by the Mountaineers was short-lived, and the result was the same. Leading 12-7 in the third quarter, the Mountaineers saw Kansas State roar back to score 28 unanswered points for the victory.

Each game became more important as the Mountaineers needed wins to qualify for a bowl berth, and it was no different for TCU as WVU invaded Fort Worth in early November. After an early Lambert field goal, TCU scored 17 straight points and looked to be in control. However, a 31-yard run by Sims midway through the second quarter stopped the bleeding and pulled the Mountaineers within seven.

TCU intercepted Trickett for the second time at the end of the third quarter and returned it to the two-yard line and were set to increase its lead to two touchdowns, when Trevone Boykin took the snap and was headed around the right side when WVU's Isaiah Bruce belted him and forced a fumble.

That was the break the Mountaineers needed as they embarked on a 17-point scoring streak, giving them a 10-point lead midway through the final stanza. After a second Lambert field goal at the beginning of the quarter, Cody Clay was on the receiving end of his first touchdown of the season set up by a second straight TCU turnover and a third straight Horned Frog turnover sparked a 13-yard scoring reception by Sims.

However, TCU wasn't done and marched down the field and scored with just over three minutes left in the game, and then went 39 more yards in the final 1:19 to tie the game on a field goal from 45-yards out with just 19 seconds left.

The overtime period belonged to the Mountaineers as the defense pushed the Horned Frogs back and forced them to try an unsuccessful 62-yard field goal, before Lambert converted the game winner from 34-yards.

Riding a five-game win streak and looking to aid its Big 12 Championship cause, Texas came to Morgantown on Nov. 9. West Virginia started strong in its upset bid, scoring nine points on a safety and a three-yard run by Sims, before the Longhorns returned the favor, scoring the next 10 points to take a one-point lead in the second quarter.

Two more touchdowns by Sims and a

Lambert field goal gave WVU a 10-point cushion midway through the third quarter, before Texas struck again for two touchdowns, giving the Longhorns their second lead of the game, 30-26, at the end of the third quarter.

Back-and-forth the game went throughout the fourth quarter. First, WVU scored on an eight-yard run by Smith to give the Mountaineers the lead, before Texas took it back on its next drive with a 10-yard pass play from Case McCoy to Jaxon Shipley. Less than a minute later, West Virginia regained the lead when Millard found Alford on a quick slant, and he raced 72 yards into the end zone, giving WVU the slim three-point lead midway through the fourth quarter.

WVU then had to run the final 6:34 off the clock to earn the hard-fought victory. After gaining a first down, the Mountaineers could not convert a second-and-one and a third-and-one and were forced to punt. A 30-yard punt set Texas up with 2:35 left in the game and 57 yards for either a field goal to tie or a touchdown for the win. The Longhorns converted a 4th-and-7 on their way down to the seven-yard line, where the WVU defense held, forcing a 24-yard game-tying field goal with



seconds left.

Texas got the ball first in overtime. The Mountaineer defense held on the first two downs, before a 14-yard pass play took the Longhorns down to the five-yard line. Three plays later, Texas found the end zone. Then West Virginia rode an Alford reverse 20 yards to the five-yard line, before two incomplete passes and an interception ended the game for WVU.

With its proverbial back against the wall, the Mountaineers had to win both remaining games to earn the bowl bid. Kansas, who struggled all year, had other plans, and rode James Sims, to 211 rushing yards and three touchdowns en route to the 31-19 upset victory. Millard replaced the injured Trickett and finished 24-of-43 for 245 yards and two touchdowns, and Sims ran for 99 yards and scored two touchdowns. Clarke led WVU with 10 tackles, including two for loss, and Kwiatkoski finished with eight tackles, including 1.5 tackles for loss and recovered a fumble.

West Virginia returned home to play its final game of the season against lowa State in hopes of finishing with a win to honor its





14 seniors. The Mountaineers took a 31-14 halftime lead on two Sims touchdown runs, a White 17-yard touchdown reception from Trickett and a 38-yard fumble return by Joseph.

However, Iowa State outscored WVU 24-7 in the fourth quarter, including a 19-yard touchdown pass with a minute left in regulation to tie the game and force the third overtime game for West Virginia in its last four games.

The game remained tied after two overtimes, and Justin Coleman, who tied the game in regulation, caught the winning touchdown on the first play of the third overtime period and the Cyclones converted the two-point conversion. WVU, like in its game against Texas, moved down to the three-yard line on its first offensive play, but two runs each netted negative yards, an incomplete pass and a completed pass that was stopped at the two-yard line thwarted the Mountaineers chances.

The inexperience, inconsistency and injuries slowed the Mountaineers the entire season, but enough experience was established throughout the year to give the program positive building blocks to forge a solid foundation that will prove beneficial heading into the 2014 season.
