#### The 2011 Season

✓ West Virginia posted a 10-3 overall record for the 2011 season and finished with a 5-2 mark in BIG EAST Conference action. The 10 wins marked the first time since 2007 that the Mountaineers have finished with double-figure wins and the eighth time in school history. WVU won the BIG EAST Championship for the second year in a row, sixth time since 2003 and seventh time in the school's history.

The Mountaineers started the season ranked No. 24 in the preseason polls, stayed in the polls for nine weeks, before dropping out on Nov. 6. WVU reappeared at No. 22 on Nov. 27 and finished the season with a No. 17 ranking in the *AP* Poll and a No. 18 ranking in the *USA Today* Coaches' Poll. That marked the sixth time in the last seven years that WVU has finished the season in the national rankings.

#### Discover Orange Bowl Champions

✓ Orange Bowl MVP Geno Smith threw for a bowl-record 407 yards and six touchdowns and ran for another score to lead West Virginia to an impressive 70-33 victory over No. 14 Clemson on Wednesday, Jan. 4. West Virginia tied or set 28 Orange Bowl individual, team and combined team records were smashed by the end of the night.

The game was tight early, before WVU scored at the beginning of the second quarter to take a four-point lead, 21-17. On their next possession, the Tigers were driving deep in Mountaineer territory when Doug Rigg forced a Clemson fumble on the goal line, and Darwin Cook picked it up and raced 99 yards for a touchdown, giving West Virginia an 11-point lead. That started the fury, as the Mountaineers proceeded to outscore the Tigers, 35-3, to put the game out of reach.

The Mountaineers' 70 points were the most points scored all-time in a bowl game. The 49 points scored by WVU in the first half and the 35 points scored in the second quarter were also the most points scored in bowl history.

- √ WVU has the 13th-best record in college football in the last six years (2006-11).
- ✓ WVU ties for the 11th-best record in college football in the last seven years (2004-11).
- √WVU has the 11th-best record in college football in the last eight years (2003-11).
- √ WVU is 93-51-1 all-time in BIG EAST play/53-16 since 2002.
- √WVU has outrushed its opponents in 65-of-82 games; WVU's record is 64-18 during that span.
- ✓ WVU is 63-4 since 2002 when winning the turnover battle.
- $\checkmark$  Since 2000, WVU is 75-3 when scoring 30 or more points in a contest.
- ✓ Since 2002, WVU is 52-4 when it has held an opponent under 100 yards rushing.
- √ In 2011, WVU quarterback Geno Smith was 346-of-526 for 4,385 yards, all WVU single-season records.
- ✓ Smith is No. 2 on WVU career passing chart (7,457) and No. 3 on WVU's career total offense chart (7,648).
- $\checkmark$  Smith is No. 2 on WVU's career completion list (619) and tied for No. 2 on the touchdown list (56).
- ✓ WVU is one of two schools in the nation to post a 4,000-yard pass and two 1,000-yard receivers (Houston).
- WVU is one of four schools in the nation to post two 1,000-yard receivers (Houston, USC, SMU).
- ✓ WVU receiver Stedman Bailey set the school single-season receiving yards mark (1,279).
- √WVU receiver Tavon Austin set the school single-season reception mark (101).
- $\checkmark$  In 2011, Austin was No. 1 nationally in all-purpose yardage, setting the school record (2,574).
- ✓ WVU DL Julian Miller finished his career No. 2 on WVU's career tackles for loss (42.5) and sack (27.5) lists.

#### Coaching Highlights West Virginia

- ✓ Named FWAA First-Year Head Coach of the Year
- ✓ Posted a 10-3 mark in his first season as head coach, only WVU coach to win 10 games in his first year
- ✓ Led West Virginia to BIG EAST Championship and BCS win, first WVU coach to accomplish that feat
- ✓ Earned national rankings in 13 of the 16 weeks for the season in both AP and USA Today Coaches Polls
- ✓ Tied for fourth in wins among first-year head coaches nationally
- One of seven coaches to take his program to a BCS Bowl in his first year as a head coach, and only one of three (Larry Coker, 2001; Chris Peterson, 2007) to win.
- √ Fourth WVU coach to make a bowl appearance and win in his first season (Bill Stewart, Dudley DeGroot, Marshall Glenn)
- ✓ Three Mountaineer players earned seven All-America honors
- ✓ WVU led the BIG EAST with 10 all-conference honorees and had the Special Teams Player of the Year,
- √ WVU finished No. 6 nationally in passing offense, No. 13 in scoring offense and No. 15 in total offense.
- ✓ The Mountaineer offense ranked No. 67 in total offense in 2010, the year before Holgorsen arrived, and he took it to No. 15 in 2011.
- √ In 2011, Austin and Stedman Bailey were the fourth pair of 1,000-yard receivers nationally (Houston, USC, SMU).
- ✓ WVU was one of only two schools nationally to have a 4,000-yard passer and two 1,000-yard receivers (Houston).
- Quarterback Geno Smith finished No. 5 nationally in passing yards per game, No. 8 in completions per game and total offense and No. 17 in passing efficiency.
- Austin finished No. 1 nationally in all-purpose yardage (198.0), No. 6 in punt returns, No. 8 in receptions per game, No. 20 in kickoff returns and No. 23 in receiving yards per game.
- ✓ Bailey finished No. 13 nationally in receiving yards per game.

#### Oklahoma State

- ✓ In 2010, was named a finalist for the Frank Broyles Award, signifying the top assistant coach in college football and named the rivals.com national offensive coordinator of the year
- ✓ In 2010, the Cowboys led the nation in total offense during the regular season and finished No. 2 in passing offense and No. 3 in total and scoring offense.
- OSU averaged 520.23 yards per game in total offense, including 345.9 passing yards and 44.23 points per game.
- The Cowboy offense ranked No. 61 nationally in total offense in 2009, the year before Holgorsen arrived, and he took it to the No. 1 spot in 2010.
- Quarterback Brandon Weeden became the first OSU passer to earn first team all-Big 12 honors. He was a finalist for the Manning Award, given to the top quarterback in the nation.
- Receiver Justin Blackmon was named the recipient of the 2010 Biletnikoff Award, given to the top receiver in the nation, and running back Kendall Hunter was a finalist for the Doak Walker Award, given to the nation's top running back.
- Weeden, Hunter and Blackmon became only the second trio in NCAA history to pass for at least 3,000 yards, run for more than 1,500 yards and finish with more than 1,500 yards receiving in the same season.

#### Houston

- ✓ In 2009, UH led the nation in total offense with 563 yards per game, scoring offense with 42.2 points per game, and passing offense with 433.7 yards per game.
- ✓ In 2008, his first year at Houston, the Cougars ranked second in the nation in passing offense (401.6) and total offense (562.77). UH scored 40.62 points per game to rank 10th nationally.
- ✓ Houston quarterback Case Keenum led the nation in total offense in 2008 and 2009, with 403.15 yards of total offense per game as a sophomore and 416.36 yards of offense as a junior.
- ✓ Keenum ranked among the nation's top-10 passing efficiency leaders each of his two seasons under Holgorsen's watch.

#### **Texas Tech**

- During his tenure as offensive coordinator, the Red Raiders increased their offensive numbers from 324.8 yards per game to 529.6 yards per game.
- ✓ In 2007, Texas Tech led the nation in passing offense (470.31 yards per game), ranked second in total offense (529.62 yards per game) and was seventh in scoring offense (40.92 points per game).
- Quarterback Graham Harrell led the nation in total offense and receiver Michael Crabtree led the nation in receptions per game and receiving yards per game. Crabtree won the Biletnikoff Award as America's top receiver in 2007.
- ✓ In 2006, the Red Raiders ranked third nationally in passing offense and sixth in total offense. Harrell was third nationally in total offense with 344.38 yards per game.
- ✓ In 2005, Texas Tech led the nation in passing offense with 388.83 yards per game, was fourth in scoring offense at 39.42 points per game and was sixth in total offense with 495.83 yards per contest.
- ✓ Quarterback Cody Hodges ranked second in the country with 369.08 yards per game.

#### Wingate

✓ Coached Lucas Greene who led the team in scoring that season and went on to play in the NFL

#### Mississippi College

Mississippi College won the American Southwest Conference in its first season in the league and averaged 432.0 yards per game in 1997.

#### Valdosta State

- ✓ Helped develop quarterback Chris Hatcher, who set an NCAA record, completing 74.7 percent of his
  passes on the Division II level in 1994.
- ✓ Hatcher's 10,588 passing yards ranked third on the NCAA career list at the time.
- ✓ Hatcher currently ranks second in the NCAA record books in career touchdown passes (116) and third in single-season touchdown passes (50 in 1994) and was the NCAA passing champion in 1994.

#### First Year BCS Head Coaches

✓ With West Virginia winning the three-way tie for the 2011 BIG EAST Conference championship with Louisville and Cincinnati, it earned its third BCS bowl appearance and first for coach Dana Holgorsen. He is one of seven coaches to earn a BCS bowl bid in their first year as a head coach, and one of three to win their bowl game.

✓ The 2012 Discover Orange Bowl marked the first bowl game that Dana Holgorsen has coached in as a head coach and first at West Virginia. However, he is not a stranger to bowl games, as the Discover Orange Bowl was his 12th straight bowl game he has coached in - as an assisant or head coach, one at Oklahoma State, two at Houston, eight at Texas Tech and one at West Virginia. In the 12 bowl games in which Holgorsen has coached in, his teams' has posted an 8-4 record.

### 2012 Discover Orange Bowl No. 23/22 West Virginia 70, No. 14/14 Clemson 33

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (Jan. 4, 2012) - West Virginia turned in a record-setting night in the Discover Orange Bowl, as the Mountaineers scored the most points in bowl history with a 70-33 victory over No. 14 Clemson.

More than 28 Orange Bowl individual, team and combined team records also were tied or smashed in the game, as MVP Geno Smith threw for a bowl and BCS record 407 yards and six touchdowns, while adding a rushing touchdown of his own, to lead the way for the Mountaineers.

Junior receiver Tavon Austin was Smith's favorite target on the night with a BCS and bowl record four touchdown receptions, as his final totals stood at 117 yards receiving and a bowl-record 280 all-purpose yards.

The game was exciting from the start, as the two teams combined for 31 points in the first quarter alone. The Tigers held a 17-14 lead at the end of the quarter on the strength of a 68-yard scoring run by Andre Ellington to start the scoring, a 27-yard pass from Tajh Boyd to Sammy Watkins and a 42-yard Chandler Catanzaro field goal.

West Virginia answered the Clemson scores with a four-yard Shawne Alston touchdown run to end a 72-yard drive and an eight-yard scoring reception by Austin.

The second quarter is when the game changed for good. Instead of both teams trading scoring punches, West Virginia reeled off 35 points to take command of the game.

With Clemson up 17-14, Austin caught a 27-yard TD pass from Smith for a 21-17 WVU lead at the 13:25 mark. Clemson then embarked on a 72-yard drive and was about to take the lead, when Ellington was stripped by linebacker Doug Rigg at the one-yard line. Darwin Cook picked up the loose ball and returned it 99-yards for a touchdown. Instead of a Clemson lead, the Mountaineers found themselves up 11 at 28-17 with 10:28 left in the half.

Clemson answered with a 43-yard Catanzaro field goal at the 4:49 mark to cut the deficit to 28-20, but the final minutes of the first half saw the Mountaineers blow the game open.

The Mountaineers answered the Clemson score with a 64-yard drive capped off by a seven-yard run by Smith. A Pat Miller interception of Boyd set up a third scoring toss to Austin for a 42-20 WVU advantage.

To end the first half onslaught, Bruce Irvin stripped Boyd on Clemson's next possession, and WVU's Najee Goode recovered the ball at the Tiger 18-yard line. Five plays later, Alston added his second touchdown run in the game by bulling over from the one-yard line for a 49-20 Mountaineer lead at the intermission. WVU's 49 points also were a bowl and BCS record for most points in a half.


Knowing Clemson's ability to score points in a hurry, the Mountaineers did not let up in the second half and took the opening possession 73 yards, which ended on a six-yard scoring toss from Smith to Stedman Bailey for a 56-20 lead.

After holding Clemson on downs, the Mountaineers went 74 yards and took a 63-20 lead, when Smith hit Austin for a 37-yard touchdown reception with 9:18 left in the third.

The Tigers added a touchdown late in the third and fourth quarters, but between the two scores was a seven-yard Willie Milhouse touchdown reception to end a 66-yard WVU scoring drive, and putting the Mountaineers at the record mark of 70 points.

Final totals showed West Virginia with 182 yards rushing and 407 passing for 589 yards of offense. Clemson finished with 193 rushing and 250 passing for 443 yards.

The appearance was WVU's first in the Orange Bowl, and the win gave the Mountaineers a 3-0 mark all-time in BCS bowl games and evened the all-time series with Clemson at 1-1.

✓ With the 70-33 win in the 2012 Discover Orange Bowl, West Virginia now holds a 14-17 all-time record in bowl games, dating back to the 1922 East-West Game.

This year's bowl game marked the 10th consecutive year that West Virginia has gone to a bowl game, for the first time in school history. The old record of nine in a row was from 2002-10, when the Mountaineers made trips to the Continental Tire Bowl, four Gator Bowls, Sugar Bowl, Fiesta Bowl, Meineke Car Care Bowl and the Champs Sports Bowl.

#### In BCS Bowls

✓ West Virginia now holds a 3-0 mark in BCS Bowls after defeating Clemson, 70-33, in the 2012 Discover Orange Bowl.

The Mountaineers defeated SEC Champion, Georgia, 38-35, in the 2006 Nokia Sugar Bowl in Atlanta, and Big 12 Champion, Oklahoma, 48-28, in the 2008 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl in Glendale, Ariz.

#### Rolling After Bowling

✓ In the 30 seasons after going to a bowl, the Mountaineers have compiled a 225-120-5 record. WVU has earned back-to-back bowl berths 16 times, including 10 straight, currently a school record.

#### Mountaineers in Pro Stadiums

✓ Since 1980, the Mountaineers hold a 27-19 mark in stadiums that also house a professional football team at the time. West Virginia was 3-0 in professional stadiums in 2011 having defeated Cincinnati at Paul Brown Stadium, 24-21, back on Nov. 12, USF, 30-27, on Dec. 1 at Raymond James Stadium and Clemson 70-33 on Jan. 4 in Miami's Sun Life Stadium. Currently, WVU is riding a four-game winning streak in pro stadiums and is 3-0 under Dana Holgorsen in professional venues.

The record includes games played at Atlanta's Georgia Dome, University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz., Raymond James Stadium in Tampa, Pittsburgh's Heinz Field, Giants Stadium, Veterans Stadium, Atlanta Fulton County Stadium, the Houston Astrodome, Miami's Orange Bowl, Riverfront Stadium in Cincinnati, Tempe's Sun Devil Stadium, the Louisiana Superdome, Jacksonville's Gator Bowl, Dolphins Stadium in Fort Lauderdale (now Sun Life Stadium), Adelphia Coliseum in Nashville, Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium, Cincinnati's Paul Brown Stadium and Three Rivers Stadium in Pittsburgh.

In the current Sun Life Stadium, which also used to be knows as Joe Robbie and Pro Player Stadium, West Virginia is now 1-2 all-time having dropped the 1994 Carquest Bowl (24-21) to South Carolina and the 1997 Carquest Bowl (35-30) to Georgia Tech before winning the Discover Orange Bowl

Since 1998, West Virginia has played every bowl game in a pro stadium expect for the 1998 Insight. com Bowl in Tucson, Ariz., and the 2010 Champs Sports Bowl in Orlando Fla.





#### Against The ACC

✓ West Virginia is 98-97-5 against current members of the ACC, including a 9-8 record since 2002 with this year's 37-31 victory at Maryland and a 70-33 victory over Clemson in the Discover Orange Bowl.

WVU is 21-11-1 against Boston College; 1-1 vs. Clemson; 1-3 vs. Duke; 0-3 against Florida State; 1-2 against Georgia Tech, 25-21-2 against Maryland, 3-16 vs. Miami, 1-1 against North Carolina; 5-5 vs. NC State; 10-12-1 against Virginia; 28-22-1 vs. Virginia Tech; and 2-0 all-time vs. Wake Forest.

With the 37-31 victory at Maryland on Sept. 17, and the 70-33 victory over Clemson on Jan. 4, the Mountaineers currently have won six of their last eight games against teams which currently hail from the ACC.

#### Against The ACC In Bowls

✓ West Virginia is 4-11 in bowl games versus the ACC in 15 meetings. West Virginia has played GeorgiaTech (1-2), North Carolina State (1-2), Florida State (0-3), Clemson (1-1), North Carolina (1-1), Virginia (0-1) and Maryland (0-1).

West Virginia faced an ACC team in a bowl game for the fourth consecutive year, having defeated North Carolina and losing to Florida State and North Carolina State.

The Mountaineers are now 1-1 all-time against Clemson after losing, 27-7, to the Tigers in the 1989 Gator Bowl and winning 70-33 in the 2012 Discover Orange Bowl

#### Against The BIG EAST

✓ WVU is 137-107-6 all-time against current members of the BIG EAST Conference. WVU is 27-32 against Syracuse; 33-4-2 against Rutgers; 10-3 versus Louisville; 16-3-1 versus Cincinnati; 7-1 against Connecticut; 40-61-3 against Pitt; and 4-3 against USF. Since the league started in 1991, WVU is 93-51-1 in all-time BIG EAST play and 49-22-1 in league home games, while 44-29 in league road games

#### Mountaineers in the BCS

✓ West Virginia finished No. 23 in the final BCS standings released on Dec. 4. It was the seventh time since 2002 that WVU has been ranked in the final BCS rankings. Its highest finish in the BCS standings was No. 9 in 2007.

#### No Lower Than Second

✓ West Virginia has finished no lower than second-place in the BIG EAST Conference in each of the last 10 years.

With the win against USF, West Virginia shared the 2011 BIG EAST league title with Cincinnati and Louisville. That marked West Virginia's seventh BIG EAST title, the most of any school currently in the conference, and tying the Mountaineers with Miami for most all-time.

The Mountaineers have won two straight BIG EAST championships and six in the last nine years.







#### **Double Digit Wins**

✓ With the 70-33 win over Clemson in the Discover Orange Bowl, West Virginia finished the 2011 season with a 10-3 record,

The 2011 season marked the eighth time in WVU history that a team has finished with double-figure wins.

✓ Since 1980, West Virginia is 45-55 in games played on natural grass surfaces. WVU was 3-0 on grass surfaces in 2011 with a 37-31 win at Maryland, a 30-27 win at USF and a 70-33 win over Clemson in the Discover Orange Bowl.

Since 2001, the Mountaineers are 21-19 on natural grass surfaces and 3-0 under Dana Holgorsen.

Currently, the Mountaineers have a four-game winning streak on natural grass surfaces.

#### In New Year's Bowls

✓ With its appearance in the 2012 Discover Orange Bowl on Jan. 4, West Virginia has played in a New Year's bowl game in seven of the past nine years.

Those games include the 2004, 2005, 2007 and 2010 Gator Bowls, 2006 Sugar Bowl, 2008 Fiesta Bowl and 2012 Orange Bowl.

The two times that WVU didn't play in a New Year's bowl game during that stretch was in 2008, when it played in the Meineke Car Care Bowl, and 2010, when it played in the Champs Sports Bowl.

Only three other teams beside WVU can make the same claim: Florida. Ohio State and LSU.

#### AFCA Honors WVU Football

✓ WVU was once again recognized nationally for graduating 75 percent or more of its football student-athletes.

This marks the third year in a row that the program has been recognized and the fifth time in the past nine years (2011, 2010, 2009, 2004, 2003) that it has been named among programs nationally for graduating 75 percent or better of its student athletes.

This year's award marks the fourth time the NCAA's Graduation Success Rate (GSR) formula has been used to select the winner. From 1981 to 2007, the award was presented based on a formula used by the College Football Association and AFCA.

#### The 2011 Mountaineer Roster

✓ The 2011 roster consisted of 107 players from 16 different states, two foreign countries and the District of Columbia.

Leading the way was the Mountain State, represented by 23 players, Florida (19), Ohio (12), Pennsylvania (13), Virginia (11), Maryland (10), Georgia (3), Alabama (2), Kentucky (2), New Jersey (2), Texas (2), Washington, D.C. (1) and one from Arizona, Illinois, New York, North Carolina and South Carolina. Offensive lineman Curtis Feigt hails from Berlin, Germany, and Soraya Aisien-Ogbebor is from Lagos, Nigeria.

#### Salute to the 2011 Mountaineer Seniors

✓ West Virginia's game with Clemson in the Discover Orange Bowl marked the final game for 23 Mountaineer seniors.

This Mountaineer class was an integral component of 37 wins, two BIG EAST championships, one 10-win season, three nine-win seasons, four bowl appearances, two bowl wins and Top 25 national rankings during their careers.

#### **December Graduates**

✓ Seven Mountaineers from the 2011 team graduated on Dec. 11: Don Barday, Julian Miller, Cody Nutter, Eain Smith, Chad Snodgrass, Keith Tandy and Tyler Urban.

The Mountaineers have had equal success on the field and in the classroom in recent years, and since 2008, there have been 69-of-76 players who have finished their degrees at West Virginia (90.8 percent).

#### At Home

√ The 2011 season marked the 32nd season of competition for West Virginia at Mountaineer Field at Milan Puskar Stadium. WVU holds a 146-51-4 (.736) all-time record at the facility, which opened in 1980.

A 2011 season-opening crowd of 60,758 were in attendance for the Marshall game, marking the largest season-opening home crowd since 1998. A capacity crowd of 62,056 were in attendance for the LSU game, the biggest crowd since Pitt in 1993. A more than capacity crown of 60,932 fans attended the Pitt game.

The Mountaineers averaged 56,532 per home game in 2011; a total of 10,958,225 fans all-time have watched a game at Mountaineer Field.

#### New WVU Tradition - Mountaineer Mantrip

✓ The inaugural West Virginia football Mountaineer Mantrip, a team walk set to rally WVU fans before each home game during the 2011 season, made its debut on Sunday, Sept. 4, prior to the Mountaineers' 2011 season opener against Marshall.

The walk, a nod to the state's proud coal industry and heritage, began when the team was dropped off approximately two hours and 20 minutes before kickoff at the corner of the WVU Medical Center and Don Nehlen Drive. Fans lined the path, which took the team and coaching staff, led by head coach Dana Holgorsen, between the blue and light blue lots and to the entrance of the Northeast gate at Milan Puskar Stadium.

The team was escorted by the Mountaineer mascot, the cheerleading squad and members of the Pride of West Virginia, the WVU marching band, on its route.

The Mantrip, named after the shuttle that typically transports miners down into an underground mine at the start of their shift, took place every home game during the 2011 season.

#### Non-Conference Play

✓ West Virginia finished its 2011 non-conference schedule with a 4-1 record. The Mountaineers defeated Marshall, 34-13, in the season opener, then won against Norfolk State, 55-12, in game two. WVU earned a 37-31 road win at Maryland, 37-31, before suffering its first loss of the season against LSU, 47-21. They dosed out the non-conference schedule with a 55-10 win over Bowling Green.

#### **BIG EAST Bests**

✓ The Mountaineers posted another winning league record in 2011 with a 5-2 mark. West Virginia's undefeated 7-0 BIG EAST record in 2005 matched the best league record by the Mountaineers since entering the conference in 1991. In 1993, West Virginia also posted a perfect 7-0 mark in BIG EAST play. Next in line is a 6-1 record in 2002 and 2003. The Mountaineers have been crowned league champions in six of the last nine years and finished in second place in 2006, 2008 and 2009.

West Virginia's third-best league record is a 5-2 mark, posted in 2006-11 and also in 1998. WVU has now posted 16 winning conference seasons in 21 years of BIG EAST action starting in 1993 (7-0), 1994 (4-3), 1995 (4-3), 1996 (4-3), 1997 (4-3), 1998 (5-2), 2002 (6-1), 2003 (6-1), 2004 (4-2), 2005 (7-0), 2006 (5-2), 2007 (5-2), 2008 (5-2), 2009 (5-2), 2010 (5-2) and 2011 (5-2).

West Virginia is 93-51-1 in all-time BIG EAST play and is 49-22-1 in BIG EAST home games, followed by a 44-29 mark in conference road games. The Mountaineers are 53-16 in BIG EAST games since the start of the 2002 season, and 36-13 in their last 49 conference games. WVU has won league championships in 1993, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2010 and 2011 and finished in second place in 2006, 2008 and 2009.

#### True Freshmen and First-Time Players

Eight true freshmen saw action for the Mountaineers this season. Those players were Connor Arlia (IR), Jared Barber (LB), Andrew Buie (RB), Dustin Garrison (RB), Paul Millard (QB), Shaq Petteway (DB), Vernard Roberts (RB) and Avery Williams (DB).

Pat Miller (USF). Darwin Cook (Clemson) and Willie Milhouse (Clemson).









#### **BIG EAST Honors**

✓ West Virginia had 10 selections to the all-BIG EAST Conference team in 2011. The Mountaineers led the BIG EAST in all-conference selections for the second straight year and boasted the Special Teams Player of the Year, Tavon Austin.

Leading the way on the first team were quarterback Geno Smith, wide receiver Austin, offensive lineman Don Barday, defensive end Bruce Irvin, linebacker Najee Goode, defensive back Keith Tandy and return specialist Austin.

Second team selections were receiver Stedman Bailey, offensive lineman Joe Madsen and defensive back Eain Smith.

Connecticut had the second-highest number of selections with nine. West Virginia had the most first team and overall selections, while UConn and USF led with six second-team honorees.

#### Against Ranked Teams

✓ Beginning with a 27-0 loss to Fordham on Oct. 18, 1941, West Virginia has played 134 games against nationally ranked teams. Of those, 39 have been Mountaineer victories. Since 2001, WVU has posted 15 victories over ranked teams.



#### **National Polls**

✓ West Virginia finished the 2011 season No. 17 in the *Associated Press* Poll and No. 18 in the *USA Today* Coaches' Poll. The Mountaineers spent 13 of the 16 weeks during the season in the national polls. WVU has been ranked in the AP Top 25 final poll in seven of the past eight years.

In 2011, West Virginia began the season at No. 24 in the AP Poll and was receiving votes in the Coaches' Poll. The Mountaineers moved up to as high as No. 11 in the AP and in a tie for No. 14 in the Coaches' Poll on Oct. 16, before losing at Syracuse on Oct. 21. After losing to Louisville on Nov. 5, WVU fell out of both polls.

The Mountaineers re-entered the coaches' poll tied for No. 23 on Nov. 13 after winning 24-21 at No. 18 Cincinnati. After the Pitt win on Nov. 25, WVU re-entered the AP Poll at 22 and climbed up to No. 20 in the Coaches' Poll.

Since 2002, West Virginia has been ranked in the Top 25 for 96 weeks, including 33 weeks in the Top 10

#### The Numbers From Two, Three, Four, Five, Six, Seven, Eight, Nine

✓ The West Virginia Mountaineers have been one of the best teams in college football in the last nine years.

West Virginia's two-year win total (2010-11) of 19 ties for 18th-best in college football with Nebraska and Florida State.

West Virginia's three-year win total (2009-11) of 28 wins is tied for 16th-best in college football with Utah, Nevada, Florida and Houston.

West Virginia's four-year total (2008-11) of 37 wins ties for 18th-best, while WVU's five-year victory total of 48 wins (2007-11) ties for 13th-best with Texas, Oklahoma State, Wisconsin and Missouri.

West Virginia's six-year (2006-11) win total of 59 is 13th-best in college football, and its 70 victories in the last seven years (2005-11) ties with Wisconsin and Oregon for the 11th-best record. Over the past eight years (2004-11), the Mountaineers have won 78 football games for the 11th-best record in the country.

And finally, West Virginia's has 86 wins in the last nine years (2003-11), which is the 12th-best mark in college football.

#### All-American Mountaineers

✓ In 2011, Tavon Austin, Don Barday and Bruce Irvin were named to at least one All-American team. Austin, No. 1 nationally in all-purpose yards, No. 6 in punt returns and No. 20 in kickoff returns, earned first team honors on CBSSports.com and Phil Steele's as an all-purpose player, second team honors as a punt returner from Yahoo! Sports, third-team Associated Press honors (all-purpose) and honorablemention from SI.com (PR). Barday, a three-year starter at left tackle, and Irvin, a two-year standout at defensive end, were both named fourth team All-Americans from Phil Steele.

Austin collected a single-season school record 2,574 yards, which includes 182 rushing yards, 1,186 receiving yards, 268 punt return yards and 938 kickoff return yards. He scored touchdowns on kickoff returns of 100 yards against Marshall and 80 yards at USF. He set the WVU single-season reception mark with 101 catches for 1,186 yards, marking the fifth Mountaineer to eclipse the 1,000-yard receiving mark, and scored eight touchdowns.

West Virginia has had at least one All-American named every year since 2002 and has had 73 All-Americans named to 210 teams.







#### For Starters

✓ In 2011, the Mountaineers had a total of 43 players with at least one game of starting experience.

Tops on that list were senior offensive lineman Don Barday (40), senior cornerback Keith Tandy (40), junior offensive lineman Joe Madsen (38) and senior defensive lineman Julian Miller (36).

#### Seven Up

✓ The Mountaineers posted their 47th season alltime with at least seven wins and 10th consecutive season with seven wins or more.

When WVU wins at least seven games in a season, the Mountaineers have gone to 18 straight bowl games.

#### Eight Ball

✓ The 2011 season marked the 35th time West Virginia won at least eight games in a season, and the 19th time it has happened since 1980.

Five teams have won eight or more games for 10 straight years: Boise State, LSU, Oklahoma and Virginia Tech.

WVU has gone to bowl games in 26 of the 35 seasons that it has recorded at least eight wins.

#### Eight x Five

West Virginia had a 10-3 record in 2011, marking the 10th straight year that the Mountaineers have won at least eight games in a season.

Five schools have accomplished this feat: Boise State, LSU, Oklahoma and Virginia Tech.

#### Nine is Fine

✓ West Virginia's 10 wins in 2011 marked the seventh year in a row that the Mountaineers have collected at least nine wins in a season.

WVU is just one of three schools to accomplish that feat, including Boise State and Virginia Tech. The Mountaineers posted 10 wins in 2011, nine wins for the three years prior (2008-10) and finished with 11 wins in each of the three seasons before (2005-07).

#### Passing Offense

✓ First-year coach Dana Holgorsen installed his spread offense, and it paid dividends as it set the school record for passing yards in a season with 4,509 yards, breaking the old record of 3,700 yards (1998) by more than 800 yards.

Quarterback Geno Smith finished with 4,385 yards passing for the 2011 season, setting the individual school passing record, previously held by Marc Bulger (3,607 - 1998). Smith also set the school individual records for completions (346) and attempts (526).

West Virginia finished No. 1 in the BIG EAST in passing yards per game and No. 6 nationally.

✓ The Mountaineers spread the ball to a variety of receivers during the 2011 season. WVU quarterbacks hooked up with nine different receivers in five of the 13 games and also had six at Rutgers and against Pitt, seven at Syracuse and aganinst Clemson, eight against Bowling Green and at USF and 10 against Louisville and at Cincinnati. Thirteen different players had at least one catch, and eight of those receivers scored a touchdown.

Tavon Austin (101), Stedman Bailey (72), Ivan McCartney (49), Devon Brown (29), Dustin Garrison (24), Tyler Urban (20), Brad Starks (14), Andrew Buie (13) and Willie Milhouse (13) each had double-figure receptions.

Bailey led the receiving corps with 12 touchdowns, Austin had eight, Starks four, McCartney three and Urban finished with two.

#### Total Offense

✓ West Virginia finished with 400 or more yards of total offense in 10 of the 13 games during the 2011 season, collecting 500 or more yards six times and 600 or more yards once.

The Mountaineers finished with a season-best 643 yards against Bowling Green, had 589 yards against Clemson in the Orange Bowl, 541 yards against Connecticut and 533 yards against Norfolk State, LSU and Louisville.

WVU led the BIG EAST in total offense and was No. 15 nationally. The Mountaineers finished with 6,104 yards of total offense to break the school record of 5,998 yards set in 2006. WVU also averaged 469.5 yards of total offense per game, to break the school record of 465.9 set in 1988.

#### Double-Figure Scoring Drives

✓ West Virginia had 24 drives of 10 plays or more during the 2011 season, marking the most since the Mountaineers ground out 25 drives of 10 plays or more in 2001. In 2010, the Mountaineers had 14 drives of 10 plays or more, 11 drives in 2009, 10 drives in 2008, 17 in 2007, 16 in 2006, 17 in 2005 and 14 in 2004 and 2003 and 22 in 2002.



#### Scoring Offense

✓ West Virginia scored 489 points during the 2011 season, an average of 37.6 per game. It ranked fourth on WVU's single season points scored list.

The Mountaineers scored 30 or more points in nine games, 40 or more points in five games and 50 or more points in three games.

WVU scored a season-high 70 points against Clemson in the Orange Bowl and had 55 against Norfolk State and Bowling Green. The Mountaineers led the BIG EAST Conference in scoring offense and were No. 13 nationally.

The Mountaineers outscored their opponents in every quarter but the first quarter. WVU was outscored 115-82 in the first quarter, but held a 167-87 advantage in the second quarter, 131-62 in the third quarter and 109-84 in the fourth quarter.

West Virginia outscored its opponents, 249-202, in the first half (19.2-15.5) and 240-146 in the second half (18.5-11.2).

#### Mountaineer First Downs

✓ West Virginia collected 301 first downs for the 2011 season, averaging 23.2 per game. The Mountaineers had 91 rushing first downs, 187 by the pass and 23 by penalty.

WVU led the BIG EAST for the most first downs during the 2011 season. The Mountaineers' per game average of 23.2 was second in the league behind USF (24.3). West Virginia was No. 27 nationally for first downs per game.

West Virginia recorded a season-high 31 first downs against Clemson and had 30 against Bowling Green. The Mountaineers had 28 against Norfolk State, LSU and Louisville and 27 at Maryland. The Mountaineers finished with a season-high 15 rushing first downs against Bowling Green, 23 passing against LSU and a season-high eight by penalty against Norfolk State.

The 31 total first downs against Clemson in the Orange Bowl were the most since posting 32 against Eastern Washington in 2006. The 15 rushing first downs against Bowling Green were the most since collecting 19 against Cincinnati in 2010. The 23 passing first downs against LSU were the most since WVU had 24 against Missouri in 1998. The eight first downs by penalty against Norfolk State were the most since the Mountaineers had eight against Florida State in the 2004 Gator Bowl.





#### 30 Is Enough

✓ Dating back to 1980, the Mountaineers hold a 157-9-1 record when scoring 30 or more points in a game. During the 1990s, the Mountaineers were 42-4 when scoring 30 or more points in a contest and were 40-2-1 in the '80s when reaching that mark. WVU is 75-3 since 2000 when scoring 30 points or more in a contest.

#### Averaae Per Down

✓ Here's a breakdown of how the 2011 West Virginia offense operated on first, second, third and fourth down.

On first down, the Mountaineers ran a total of 437 plays and gained 2,816 yards for a 6.4 average. On second down, the Mountaineers ran 324 plays for 2,031 yards and a 6.3 average. On third down, the Mountaineers ran 180 plays for 1,159 yards and a 6.4 average gain. West Virginia tried 18 fourth-down plays in 2011, gaining 98 yards for a 5.4 average.

WVU's touchdowns came 23 times on first down (13 rushing and 10 passing), 24 times on second down (9 rushing and 15 passing), eight times on third down (2 rushing, 6 passing) and two touchdowns on fourth down (1 rushing, 1 passing).

#### Offensive Analysis

Breaking down the West Virginia offensive numbers for the 2011 season, the Mountaineers ran a total of 959 plays, 417 coming on the ground and 542 through the air. The rushing game totaled 1,595 yards for an average of 3.8 yards per carry and 25 touchdowns. The passing attack totaled 4,509 yards, 32 touchdowns and an average of 12.8 yards per completion.

Combine the two and the Mountaineers turned in 6,104 yards of total offense, and 57 offensive touchdowns for an average of 6.4 yards per play, and an average of 37.6 points per game.

Deeper analysis shows that the Mountaineer offense gained 91 first downs by the run and 187 via the pass. On average, West Virginia had 122.7 yards per game on the ground, 346.8 per game passing and 469.5 yards of total offense.

#### Non-Offensive Touchdowns

✓ West Virginia scored six non-offensive touchdowns during the 2011 season, marking the most non-offensive touchdowns since the Mountaineers scored five in 2003. Tavon Austin scored touchdowns on kickoff returns of 90 (USF) and 100 yards (Marshall), Pat Miller scored on a 52-yard interception return at USF, Terence Garvin scored on a 37-yard interception return at Maryland, Julian Miller recovered a fumble for a touchdown at Cincinnati and Darwin Cook returned a fumble 99 yards for a touchdown against Clemson in the Orange Bowl.

The two non-offensive touchdowns at USF marked the most in one game this season and the most since Lance Frazier scored on a 64-yard punt return, and Adam Jones returned a fumble 47 yards against Temple in 2003.

The Mountaineers' 15 receiving efforts of 100 or more yards in 2011 passed last year's season total (3). WVU had eight 100-yard receiving efforts in 1996, seven in 1993 and six in 1994 and 1998.

#### Record Five Straight 100-Yard Receiving Performances

✓ West Virginia receiver Stedman Bailey set the school record with five consecutive games of 100 or more yards receiving during the 2011 season. Bailey first set the WVU record, becoming the first Mountaineer receiver to have 100 or more yards in three straight games, then four straight games and the streak then ended after five straight games.

He had eight receptions for 113 yards and a touchdown at Maryland, eight catches for 115 yards and a touchdown against LSU, 112 yards against Bowling Green, a career-high 178 yards on seven catches and two touchdowns against UConn and 130 yards on seven catches and a touchdown at Syracuse.

The streak was broken in the snow at Rutgers, where he had two catches for 51 yards and a touchdown. He collected his sixth 100-yard receiving performance of the season against Louisville, finishing with eight catches for 118 yards and two touchdowns and seventh at Cincinnati, when he totaled 104 yards on six catches and a touchdown.

For the season, he finished with seven 100-yard receiving performances, also a school record.

#### The Red Zone Report

✓ West Virginia scored on 88.5 percent (54/61) of its red zone drives in 2011. The Mountaineers are tied for No. 11 nationally in red zone offense. WVU missed on only seven attempts in the red zone this season - two against Norfolk State, a missed field goal and a drive that ended on downs, an interception at Syracuse, at Rutgers when the half ended, two missed field goal attempts against Louisville and a missed field goal attempt at Cincinnati.

The Mountaineers scored on 43 of their last 48 possessions in the red zone. WVU scored a season-high 49 points against Clemson in the Orange Bowl, had 45 points against Bowling Green, had 41 against Norfolk State and had 20 or more points in nine games. West Virginia scored touchdowns in 41 of 61 trips to the red zone (67.0 percent) and then scored field goals in 13 trips in the red zone.

For the season, the red zone scores were 41 touchdowns, including 23 rushing touchdowns and 18 passing touchdowns and 13 field goals. Defensively, WVU's opponents scored 40-of-48 times (83.3 percent) in the red zone, including 28 touchdowns and 12 field goals. The eight failed attempts were two missed field goals, three fumbles and three drives that ended on downs. Opponents scored touchdowns on 28-of-48 trips to the red zone (58.3 percent).

#### Looking into the Numbers

√ The Mountaineer offense saw action on 959 plays during the 2011 season and 920 plays by the defense.

Of WVU's 959 offensive plays, four players registered more than 900 offensive plays, seven players registered more than 800 offensive plays and eight players saw action on more than 700 offensive plays. Don Barclay led the offense with 947 of 959 plays, Joe Madsen with 943 plays and Geno Smith with 928 plays.

Of WVU's 920 defensive plays, four players recorded more than 900 plays and seven players recorded more than 800 plays. Darwin Cook led the defense with 911, Keith Tandy saw action in 901 plays, Najee Goode saw action in 885 plays and Eain Smith saw action in 878 plays.

Thirteen Mountaineer players saw action in more than 100 special teams plays, led by Tyler Anderson with action on more than 275 plays.







#### BIG EAST Passer Surpasses 4,000 Yards

✓ Junior guarterback Geno Smith finished with 4,385 yards passing for the 2011 season. He became the first 4,000-yard passer in WVU history and second in BIG EAST history.

That mark broke both the WVU single-season record and the BIG EAST. The previous record was held by Louisville's Brian Brohm, who finished with 4,024 yards in 2007.

#### Smith Breaks Total Offense Record

✓ Geno Smith accumulated 4,352 yards of total offense for the year, which set the WVU record and the BIG EAST record.

Smith broke Marc Bulger's record (3,515) to take over the top spot in WVU history and smashed Brohm's 2007 record of 3,978 yards.

He was responsible for 33 touchdowns (31 passing, two rushing), setting WVU's record and finishing in tie with Pitt's Pete Gonzalez (1997) and Brohn for third in BIG EAST single season history. He broke Marc Bulger (1998) and Pat White's (2006) record of 31 to take the No. 1 mark at WVU.

#### Throwing for 300 or More Yards

✓ Geno Smith threw for 300 or more vards twice before his junior season, finishing with 316 yards at Marshall and throwing for 352 yards against Rutgers.

In 2011, Smith threw for 300 or more yards eight times, setting both the WVU and the BIG EAST records.

Smith broke Marc Bulger's 1998 record of five 300-yards or more passing game to become WVU's top 300-yard passer. He broke Louisville's Brian Brohm's 2007 BIG EAST record of seven.

#### Special Teams Player of the Year

✓ Tavon Austin was a versatile member of the Mountaineer football squad as an inside receiver and punt and kick returner.

He finished with two kickoff returns for touchdowns in 2011, collecting a 100-yard return against Marshall in the season opener and a 90-yard return in the season finale at USF. His season-long punt return was 64 yards against Norfolk State.

Austin led the nation in all-purpose yards, totaling a single-season school record 2,574 yards and averaging 198 yards per game. He was No. 6 natioinally in punt returns (14.1) and No. 20 in kickoff returns (26.1).

He had six all-purpose performances of 200 yards or more, including a season-high 287 yards against LSU, 280 against Clemson, 271 against Louisville, 249 at Cincinnati, 243 at Maryland and 208 at USF. He also finished with 150 yards or more in all-purpose vardage in 10 games.

He had a career-high 287 all-purpose yards against LSU, finishing with 187 yards receiving on 11 catches and 100 kickoff return yards on six returns. That marked the most all-purpose yards since Steve Slaton had 345 all-purpose yards against Pitt in 2006.



#### Academic Bowl Championship Series

√ The 2011 season marked the fifth year that the New America Foundation's High Ed Watch Blog has used its own criteria to compile a Top 25 called "Academic Bowl Championship Series".

Four different calculations are used in the Academic BCS: the football team's graduation rate relative to the school overall; the difference between black and white graduation rates on the team; the difference between black and white graduation rates at the school overall; and the difference between the graduation rates of black players on the football team and the school's overall black student population.

They use the standard 4-class average graduation rate in the BCS rankings. This rate does not take into account students that transfer out of a college or leave to play professionally. Using this rate allows the best comparison of a football team's graduation rate to the overall graduation rate of students at that college.

Also important is the pool that our BCS ranking draws from. Each Top 25 team in the Bowl Championship Series' final standings is used, thus, the teams in the Academic BCS have displayed prominence on the field and, in the case of the top-ranked teams, in the dassroom.

The NCAA has its own measure of academic success, the academic progress rate, which measures whether a team is moving its players towards graduation. With the APR, teams get points for eligibility (having players who have good enough grades to play sports) and for retention (having players who don't drop out of college). Higher Ed Watch takes the APR into account in our formula, but assigns less weight to it than it does for other measures that we believe are more important.



## Game 1 No. 24 West Virginia 34, Marshall 13

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (Sept. 4, 2011) - In a bizarre evening in the Mountain State, Dana Holgorsen's debut as West Virginia's 33rd head football coach got off to a winning start with a 34·13 victory over Marshall.

With West Virginia leading 27-13 at the 4:59 mark of the third quarter, both teams had to leave the field and seating area as Milan Puskar Stadium was evacuated due to severe rain and lightning. After a three hour and three minute delay, the game resumed until the 14:36 mark of the fourth quarter, when lightning forced the teams off the field again. Both delays totaled four hours and 22 minutes, before the game ended with West Virginia coming away with the victory.

Marshall struck first with 10:18 left in the opening quarter when Andre Booker returned a punt 87 yards for a quick 7-0 lead for the Herd.

The Mountaineers responded with a 10-play, 71-yard drive that ended with a Tyler Bitancurt 27-yard field goal, cutting the deficit to 7-3.

West Virginia would go on to put the next three scores on the board. First, quarterback Geno Smith hit Ivan McCartney with a four-yard strike to end another 10-play drive. Then Smith directed a 13-play scoring march and connected with Stedman Bailey on a 15-yard toss, before Bitancurt came on again and connected on a 43-yard field goal for a 20-7 Mountaineer advantage late in the second quarter.

Marshall responded with a 10-play drive of its own that went for 72 yards, and the Herd got a 24-yard field goal from Tyler Warner as the half expired to cut the West Virginia lead to 20-10.

The Thundering Herd again cut into the West Virginia lead at the 5:14 mark of the third, when Warner converted on a 21-yard field goal attempt to pull the Herd within seven at 20-13.

But West Virginia quickly erased the Marshall momentum on the ensuing kickoff, as Tavon Austin returned the Herd kick 100 yards for a score and a 27-13 West Virginia advantage. It was the second kickoff return of Austin's career, and he became just the sixth Mountaineer in school history to record a 100-yard kickoff return.

Soon after the Austin return, the rain came and the sky lit up as severe weather blanketed the entire state.

When play resumed, West Virginia went on the offensive again and basically put the game away when tailback Vernard Roberts rushed in from one-yard away for a 34-13 advantage.

The second delay lasted one hour and 19 minutes before both school administrations and conference offices determined it was in the best interest of the student-athlete to end the 3:30 pm game at 10:24 p.m.

West Virginia was led by quarterback Geno Smith, who passed for 249 yards on 26 completions and two touchdowns. Bailey hauled in five catches for 76 yards, while Najee Goode led all tacklers with seven.

Marshall received 115 yards passing from true freshman Rakeem Cato, as he completed 15-of-21 passes. Tron Martinez led the Herd ground game with 76 yards rushing, while Antavious Wilson led the Herd receivers with 64 yards. Marshall's defense was paced by defensive backs Darryl Roberts and Devin Arrington with six tackles each.

Statistics for the shortened contest showed West Virginia with 42 yards rushing and 249 passing for 291 yards of total offense. Marshall finished with 72 yards on the ground and 115 in the air for 187 yards of offense.,

With the win, West Virginia improved to 11-0 all-time against Marshall and 8-0 all-time against the Thundering Herd in Morgantown. In the latest "Friends of Coal" Bowl series, West Virginia improved to 6-0 against Marshall.

## Game 2 No. 19/24 West Virginia 55, Norfolk State 12

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (Sept. 10, 2011) - In a tale of two halves, West Virginia scored 45 second-half points to defeat Norfolk State, 55-12, at Milan Puskar Stadium.

The Spartans took a 12-10 lead into the locker room at halftime, but could not handle the WVU passing attack in the second half as quarterback Geno Smith passed for a career-best 371 yards and tied his previous high mark of four touchdowns. Smith's passing yards were the seventh-highest in school history.

However, the Spartans hit some big plays early to propel them into the lead. The Spartans went up 3-0 on a 50-yard field goal by Everett Goldberg and followed that up with a 39-yard Ryan Estep field goal for a 6-0 lead with 14:41 to play in the second quarter.

West Virginia answered with two scores of its own. The first was a 17-yard Tyler Bitancurt field goal to end a 10-play drive, and the second was an 18-yard pass from Smith to receiver Devon Brown, giving the Mountaineers a 10-6 lead.

But Norfolk State would not go away in the first half. The Spartans bounced back with Estep field goals of 39 and 40 yards, the second one coming as the half ended, giving the visitors a 12-10 lead at the intermission.

The Mountaineers were a different team in the second half and unleashed a 28-point third quarter to put the rout in motion. WVU scored on seven straight possessions in the second half, and ran the clock out on its eighth.

Early in the third, tailback Vernard Roberts scored on a three-yard run on the half's opening possession. Receiver Tavon Austin pulled in a three-yard touchdown reception, followed by a three-yard scoring run by true freshman Dustin Garrison.

Tyler Urban closed out the scoring in the third stanza with a 12-yard touchdown reception, and after trailing 12-10 after two quarters, the Mountaineers took a commanding 38-12 lead after three periods of play.

Three more scores followed in the fourth quarter for West Virginia. Ivan McCartney's 39-yard touchdown catch was the longest scoring play in the game at the 14:10 mark of the fourth.

Bitancurt added his second field goal (21 yards) at the 9:39 mark before a 30-yard pass from backup quarterback Paul Millard closed out the scoring, when he hit receiver Brad Starks with 3:18 left in the game to finish off a 10-play, 57-yard scoring drive.

Three of West Virginia's nine scoring drives consisted of 10 plays or more as the Mountaineers racked up 102 yards rushing and 431 passing for an impressive 533 yards of total offense.

Besides Smith's impressive numbers, Brown

turned in a 109-yard receiving day on four catches. Austin added 82 yards receiving and Mc-Cartney 79 as the passing game dicked. Roberts led the WVU ground game with 64 yards rushing.

The Mountaineer defense did not allow a touchdown for the second straight game and received 11 tackles from Darwin Cook and eight from Terence Garvin.

Spartan quarterback Chris Walley finished with 136 yards passing. His main target was Xavier Boyce, who caught eight passes for 100 yards. Takeem Hedgeman led the running game with 62 yards, and Corwin Hammond and Onyemechi Anyaugo paced the defense with a combined 17 tackles.

Norfolk State finished with 88 yards rushing and 197 passing for 285 yards of offense.

With the win, West Virginia upped its record to 12-0 all-time against FCS schools and is now riding an 18-game non-conference winning streak at home. WVU's 431 yards passing is the first Mountaineer 400-yard passing effort since 1998, while the 533 yards of total offense was the first 500-yard output since 2009.

# Game No. 3 No. 18/20 West Virginia 37, Maryland 31

**COLLEGE PARK, Md. (Sept. 17, 2011)** - West Virginia captured the first road victory of head coach Dana Holgorsen's tenure with a 37-31 victory over Maryland.

The Mountaineers overcame an early 3-0 deficit to take a commanding lead only to hold off a furious Terrapin comeback for the win.

Trailing 3-O after a Nick Ferrara 25-yard field goal, West Virginia took the lead for good at the 3:02 mark of the first quarter, when tailback Vernard Roberts scampered in from nine yards away to end a 10-play, 88-yard scoring drive.

The Mountaineers quickly upped their lead to 14-3 with 1:44 left in the first quarter, when Terence Garvin intercepted a Danny O'Brien pass and returned it 37 yards for a score and a 14-3 West Virginia advantage, heading into the second quarter.

West Virginia added two more scores to its lead, when kicker Tyler Bitancurt added a 35-yard field goal at the 13:33 mark, and Andrew Buie scored on a 10-yard touchdown run to give WVU a 24-3 lead.

Maryland answered at the 2:32 mark, when receiver Kevin Dorsey hauled in an 18-yard touchdown pass from O'Brien to cut the Mountaineer lead to 24-10.

However, as time expired in the half, Bitancurt was good on a 34-yard field goal to end a nine-play drive and put the Mountaineers in the locker room with a 27-10 lead at the half.

It appeared as if West Virginia was going to turn the game into a rout on its first possession of the third quarter, when quarterback Geno Smith connected with receiver Stedman Bailey for a 34-yard touchdown pass, giving the Mountaineers a 34-10 advantage with 11:36 remaining.

However, Maryland would have nothing to do with a rout and staged a furious comeback in front of the fifth largest crowd in Byrd Stadium history.

Behind the running of Davin Meggett, the Terps started the comeback, when he scored on a 20-yard touchdown run. The Terp defense started to stiffen, and running back D.J. Adams added a six-yard scoring run, before the end of the third quarter to put the score at 34-23 with a quarter left to play.

Adams again found the end zone with a two-yard rush, and Meggett rushed in for the two-point conversion to cut the margin to 34-31 with 10:29 left in the game.

However, the Mountaineers proceeded to eat some clock with a 5:41 scoring drive, but only could get a 21-yard Bitancurt field goal out of it as Maryland stayed within striking distance at 37-31 with 4:42 left to play.

O'Brien marched the Terps down to the WVU

37-yard line and even converted a crucial fourth down play, but safety Eain Smith ended the Terp rally on a third-down and eight play, when he intercepted O'Brien with 1:13 left in the game to seal the WVU win.

Smith passed for 388 yards, and for the first time in school history, three receivers went over the 100-yard receiving mark in a game, as Tavon Austin (11-122), Bailey (8-113) and Ivan McCartney (8-101) pulled off the feat. Linebacker Najee Goode contributed 13 tackles in the win.

O'Brien finished with 289 yards passing, and Meggett gained 113 yards on the ground. Eric Franklin topped all tacklers with 15.

WVU rushed for 92 yards and passed for 388 to total 480 yards of total offense. The Terps netted 188 yards on the ground and 289 through the air for 477 yards of offense.

The win gave West Virginia a six-game winning streak in the series and three straight road wins in Byrd Stadium.

## Game No. 4 No. 2/3 LSU 47, No. 16/16 West Virginia 21

### MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (Sept. 24, 2011) -

Turnovers and special teams miscues spelled doom for West Virginia against No. 2 LSU as the Tigers answered every punch in defeating the Mountaineers 47-21.

The loss overshadowed the outstanding performance of junior quarterback Geno Smith, who completed 38-of-65 passes for a career-high 463 yards. Smith's numbers set school marks for completions, attempts and yards as the WVU passing game continues to thrive in first-year head coach Dana's Holgorsen's offense.

A crowd of 62,056 at Milan Puskar Stadium along, with an ABC national prime time audience, tuned in for the non-conference showdown between the BIG EAST and SEC.

LSU quickly jumped out to a 13-0 lead at the end of the first quarter, when Rueben Randle caught an 11-yard touchdown pass from Jarrett Lee. Tailback Michael Ford followed that score later in the quarter with a 22-yard touchdown run, but the PAT failed giving the Tigers a 13-point lead.

West Virginia got on the scoreboard at the 12:30 mark of the second quarter, when receiver Stedman Bailey caught a 20-yard touchdown pass from Smith to cut the WVU deficit to 13-7.

However, LSU answered with a 61-yard drive in just three plays to quiet the Mountaineer faithful, as Odell Beckham hauled in a 52-yard pass from Lee for a 20-7 Tiger advantage.

The Tigers struck again before the end of the half by taking advantage of an interception that set them up deep in WVU territory. Chase Clement's one-yard plunge into the end zone gave the visiting Tigers a 27-7 lead at the half, behind three WVU turnovers.

West Virginia ignited the home fans once again in the third quarter, and got Milan Puskar Stadium rocking with two scores to cut the LSU lead down to 27-21 at the 1:16 mark.

Tyler Urban was the recipient of a 12-yard Smith touchdown pass to end an 80-yard drive, and tailback Dustin Garrison dove in from one-yard away to finish off a 90-yard drive.

With the Mountaineers down only six and with what seemed to be all the momentum, LSU answered with what turned out to be the knockout blow.

On the ensuing kickoff after the Garrison score, LSU's Morris Claiborn returned the kick 99 yards to stun the stadium and put the Tigers up 34-21 heading into the fourth quarter.

LSU finished the game with two more scores in the final stanza. Running back Michael Ford scampered in from 15-yards away to end a nine-play drive, and Alfred Blue scored on an 18-yard run, ending a 55-yard drive, and giving the Tigers


the big road non-conference victory in their first ever trip to Morgantown.

Aside from Smith's fine totals, West Virginia placed two receivers over the 100-yard mark as Tavon Austin hauled in 11 catches for 187 yards. Bailey had a strong evening with eight catches for 115 yards and a touchdown. The Mountaineer defense was paced by linebacker Doug Rigg with nine tackles, followed by Najee Goode with eight.

Ward and Ford led the Tiger rushing attack with 92 and 82 yards, respectfully. Lee was solid with 180 yards passing and three touchdowns. Randle caught six passes for 53 yards and a score, while Eric Reid topped LSU in tackles with seven.

The LSU defense was heralded as one of the nation's best coming into the game, but the Mountaineers totaled 70 yards on the ground and 463 in the air for 533 yards of total offense. LSU finished with a balanced 186 yards rushing and 180 passing for 366 total yards.

Two fumbles and two interceptions doomed the Mountaineers and ended their 18-game non-conference home win streak.

# Game No. 5 No. 22/23 West Virginia 55, Bowling Green 10

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (Oct. 1, 2011) - Behind the running of true freshman Dustin Garrison, West Virginia stormed past Bowling Green, 55-10, on a wet and cold afternoon at Milan Puskar Stadium.

Garrison became WVU's first 100-yard rusher of the season with 291 yards on 32 carries and two touchdowns. He averaged 9.1 yards per carry and tied the WVU record for the second-best rushing performance in school history. His rushing total was the best mark for a WVU freshman and the single-best mark in the nation through the first five weeks of the season. His 233 yards at half-time also set the school mark for yards in a half.

Behind Garrison and an improving offensive line, West Virginia totaled an impressive 643 yards of total offense with 360 yards coming on the ground and 283 through the air. More impressive was the fact that WVU had 306 total rushing yards after four games and passed the season total in one game. The 643 yards of total offense was the best of the decade and the Holgorsen era. The total offense number comes in as third-best in school history and tops in the 31-year history of Milan Puskar Stadium.

The rain and cold did not seem to bother the Mountaineers, who were turnover free, while only punting once. West Virginia used a fumble recovery on the game's opening kickoff to record a 3-0 lead, as kicker Tyler Bitancurt connected on a 30-yard field goal.

The lead was short-lived and Bowling Green's Boo Boo Gates returned the ensuing kickoff 77 yards to the WVU 18. From there, Falcon quarterback Matt Schilz hit Ray Hutson for an 18-yard scoring pass, and the Falcons went ahead 7-3.

Bowling Green increased its lead to 10-3 later in the first quarter when an 11-play drive resulted in a 21-yard field goal from kicker Stephen Stein.

However, those three points proved to be the final ones for the Falcons, as West Virginia's offense took control to score the next 52 points.

Before the first quarter ended, receiver Ivan McCartney grabbed a 33-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Geno Smith, and running back Shawne Alston rushed in for an eight-yard score and a 17-10 WVU lead after one quarter of play.

The Mountaineers added three more touchdowns in the second quarter to take a 38-10 lead at the half.

Receiver Ryan Nehlen caught the first touchdown of his career at the 12:38 mark on a 15-yard reception. Garrison rushed in from 19-yards away at the 8:53 mark, and receiver Brad Starks added a six-yard scoring catch with 2:43 left in the half.

West Virginia kept its foot on the throttle in the third quarter behind the running of Garrison and the passing of Smith. For his second score in the

game, Garrison reached the end zone from eight yards away, while Bitancurt added a 45-yard field goal for a 48-10 Mountaineer advantage with one quarter left to play.

The scoring ended at the 7:52 mark of the fourth quarter when Alston rushed in from eight yards out, giving him two touchdowns in the game. Garrison also finsihed with two touchdowns, and Smith passed for three scores. Stedman Bailey went over the 100-yard receiving mark for a school-record third straight game, finishing with four catches for 112 yards.

On defense, Keith Tandy came away with two interceptions, while Jewone Snow led the WVU defense in his first career start with nine tackles.

Bowling Green got 119 yards rushing from Jamel Martin, and Dwayne Woods and Aaron Foster led the defense with 10 tackles each.

The Falcons finished with 103 rushing yards and 114 passing for 217 total yards.

With the win, West Virginia improved to 4-1 on the year and 3-0 all-time against Bowling Green with all three games coming in Morgantown.

## Game No. 6 No. 16/19 West Virginia 43, Connecticut 16

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (Oct. 8, 2011) - A 33-point second half enabled West Virginia to capture its first BIG EAST win of the 2011 season with a convincing 43-16 win over Connecticut in the conference opener for both teams.

The Mountaineers put up 541 yards of total offense on the Huskies with 469 coming through the air. Quarterback Geno Smith completed 27-of-45 passes and 450 yards, with four touchdowns to pace the offensive attack.

Śmith's favorite target was once again receiver Stedman Bailey, who turned in a school-record fourth straight 100-yard receiving performance. Along with an 84-yard touchdown reception, Bailey hauled in a total of seven catches for 178 yards and two touchdowns to lead all receivers for the game.

After Connecticut's opening drive ended in a missed field goal, the Mountaineers wasted no time in getting on the scoreboard. A 61-yard drive resulted in a 31-yard Tyler Bitancurt field goal for a 3-0 WVU lead with 7:43 left in the first quarter.

However, Connecticut's keep-away game was working early and long sustained drives by the Huskies kept the Mountaineer offense off the field.

A 4:13 drive resulted in a 40-yard David Teggart field goal, before he followed that up with a 53-yarder at the 14:53 mark of the second quarter to give UConn a 6-3 lead.

Sparked by a 24-yard completion from Smith to Bailey, West Virginia took the lead for good with 2:44 left in the half, when running back Dustin Garrison rushed in from 14-yards away. However, UConn made the most of the final minutes and moved the ball 53 yards to convert a 22-yard Teggart field goal to put the halftime score at 10-9 in favor of the Mountaineers.

West Virginia took control of the game in the third quarter with a 23-point outburst, while the Mountaineer defense held the Huskies at bay.

A key stretch came at the 7:54 mark of the third, with Connecticut driving to the WVU 13-yard line. UConn quarterback Johnny McEntee fumbled, and the ball was recovered by WVU linebacker Jewone Snow, who returned it 83 yards to the UConn 12-yard line. That play ignited the Mountaineer offensive outburst. Two plays later, Smith connected with receiver Tavon Austin for a 12-yard scoring toss and a 17-9 advantage.

On WVU's first play of its next possession, Smith hooked up with Bailey for an 84-yard touchdown reception to extend its lead to 24-9.

The Mountaineer defense got in on the scoring action, as Bruce Irvin and Snow sacked McEntee for a safety, before receiver Brad Starks made a leaping 22-yard touchdown catch, giving the Mountaineers a 33-9 lead heading into the fourth

quarter.

The West Virginia offense wasn't done in the final stanza, adding 10 more points. A 33-yard Bitancurt field goal, along with a Smith strike to Bailey from 27-yards out at the 9:50 mark, gave WVU a 32-9 advantage.

The Husky defense intercepted backup quarterback Paul Millard later in the fourth and returned it 48 yards for a score, putting the final total at 43-16

Aside from Smith and Bailey's offensive numbers, Ivan McCartney turned in 131 yards receiving on six catches, while the strong WVU defensive effort was led by Snow with seven stops and the 83-yard fumble return.

UConn got 193 yards passing from McEntee and 73 yards rushing from Lyle McCombs to total 275 yards of offense. Sio Moore led the Husky defense with eight stops.

With the win, West Virginia improved to 7-1 all-time against Connecticut and 4-0 all-time in Morgantown.

# Game No. 7 Syracuse 49, No. 11/T14 West Virginia 23

**SYRACUSE, N.Y.** (**Oct. 21, 2011**) - Syracuse capitalized on strong special teams play and two West Virginia turnovers to defeat the Mountaineers, 49-23, in a Friday night ESPN game at the Carrier Dome.

The Mountaineers lost at Syracuse for the first time since 2001 and have dropped two straight in the long-standing series after winning eight in a row against the Orange from 2002-09.

The Orange got strong play from quarterback Ryan Nassib, who played mistake-free football in passing for 229 yards and four touchdowns, while also rushing for one score to account for five in the game. A fired-up Syracuse defense blitzed most of the evening and pressured WVU quarterback Geno Smith enough to slow down a West Virginia offense that was averaging 40.8 points per game coming into the contest.

The game did not get out of hand until the second half as first-half action saw a competitive contest despite some Mountaineer miscues.

The Orange started off the scoring on their second possession with a 14-play, 84-yard drive that saw Nassib hit Nick Provo for a three-yard touchdown.

West Virginia answered with a 10-play drive that resulted in a 27-yard Tyler Bitancurt field goal to cut the deficit to 7-3 with 1:06 left in the opening quarter.

The Orange went up 14-3, when Nassib rushed in from one-yard away to close out a 14-play, 80-yard drive. However, the Mountaineers quickly answered and seemed to be in good shape, as Smith hit receiver Stedman Bailey on a long 64-yard touchdown reception. With a missed extra point, WVU only trailed the Orange 14-9 with 8:41 left in the half.

Any momentum the Mountaineers gained was quickly lost on the ensuing kickoff, as Dorian Graham's 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown took the wind out of WVU's sails. A late Syracuse interception on the goal line thwarted another potential score for the Mountaineers, giving the Orange the lead 21-9 at the half.

West Virginia's opening possession of the second half once again gave the Mountaineers some momentum, as they marched 57 yards in 14 plays and got a touchdown behind a one-yard plunge from Shawne Alston, cutting the deficit to 21-16 with 10:07 left.

But just like the first half, Syracuse answered back. David Stevens hauled in a 29-yard pass from Nassib for a 28-16 score and the flood gates started to open.

Syracuse added two more scores, before WVU could answer. Nassib hit Provo for a 10-yard scoring toss to end the third quarter and then found him again at the 11:29 mark of the fourth

for a five-yard touchdown reception and a 42-16 Syracuse advantage.

Smith connected with receiver Brad Starks for West Virginia's final score, as the two hooked up for a 25-yard touchdown completion at the 9:18 mark

Syracuse ended the scoring with 5:26 left in the game on Antwon Bailey's three-yard run, giving the Orange the commanding 26-point victory.

Smith ended with 338 yards passing and two scores, while Bailey turned in a school-record fifth straight 100-yard receiving performance with seven catches for 130 yards. The West Virginia defense was led by linebacker Jewone Snow with eight tackles

Aside from Nassib's strong totals, Syracuse received strong performances from Bailey with 125 yards rushing and Provo with three touchdown catches.

West Virginia rushed for 70 yards and passed for 338 to total 408 yards. The Orange rushed for 194 and passed for 249 to total 443 yards.

The win upped the Orange to 5-2 overall, while WVU dropped to 5-2 on the season.

# Game No. 8 No. 25/24 West Virginia 41, Rutgers 31

**PISCATAWAY, N.J.** - (Oct. 29, 2011) - West Virginia overcame a 10-point halftime deficit and a horrendous October snow storm along the Northeast to defeat Rutgers, 41-31, for the 17th-straight time.

In a rare October snowstorm that left New Jersey in a state of emergency, both teams battled heavy snow, cold temperatures and strong wind gusts for the entire game, but still managed to put up a combined 72 points.

West Virginia took advantage of some big plays, like touchdown runs of 80 and 52 yards, while Rutgers used a time consuming offense to keep the ball away from the West Virginia offense.

By taking advantage of the strong wind behind its back, Rutgers capitalized on good field position to score first on a San San Te 40-yard field goal at the 7:17 mark of the first quarter.

West Virginia answered the score 1:10 later when running back Shawne Alston scored on a 52-yard touchdown run for a 7-3 WVU lead.

But the flurry of scoring in the opening quarter was just beginning. Rutgers regained the lead at 10-7, when quarterback Gary Nova found Mohamed Sanu for a 14-yard scoring pass.

The Mountaineers answered just 14 seconds later, when Tavon Austin took a reverse 80 yards for a 14-10 West Virginia lead at the 3:17 mark. The Scarlet Knights closed out the scoring in the first quarter, when Nova found Mark Harrison for a 45-yard touchdown pass and a 17-14 Rutgers lead.

The Mountaineers took advantage of a Rutgers fumble to regain the lead at the 12:59 mark of the second quarter, when Alston rushed in from two-yards out for a 21-14 advantage.

However, the rest of the first half belonged to Rutgers, as the Scarlet Knights added two Jawan Jamison touchdown runs of one and 18 yards to take a 31-21 lead into the locker room at halftime.

Trailing by 10 on poor field conditions certainly could give the impression that this was the year for Rutgers to break the streak, but the Mountaineers controlled the second half with a strong defensive effort and by outscoring the Scarlet Knights 20-0.

After holding Rutgers scoreless on its first two second-half possessions. the Mountaineers pulled closer on a Geno Smith to Stedman Bailey 19-yard touchdown reception at the 7:23 mark of the third.

Down three in the fourth quarter, the momentum swung when Rutgers faked a field goal try, which resulted in an incomplete pass, and the Mountaineers had new life.

From its own 11-yard line, West Virginia marched 89 yards in 11 plays to retake the lead, 34-31,

when Smith called his own number and rushed in on fourth-and-one with 6:19 left.

On RU's next possession, WVU's Julian Miller came up with his second fumble recovery in the game, and the Mountaineer offense did the rest, moving 37 yards in three plays, capped off by a 20-yard touchdown pass from Smith to Austin to extend its lead to 10. To complete the second-half shutout by the Mountaineer defense, the unit held Rutgers scoreless on its next two possessions to give the Mountaineers their second BIG EAST win of the season.

Smith finished with 218 yards passing, while Alston turned in his first career 100-yard rushing effort with 110 yards on 14 carries. Safety Darwin Cook led the defense with 11 stops.

Rutgers was led by Nova with 235 yards passing, and Jamison totaled 96 yards on the ground. Justin Francis led the Scarlet Knights defense with 10 tackles.

Despite the poor weather, both teams put up solid numbers. West Virginia rushed for 210 yards and passed for 218 to total 428 yards. Rutgers rushed for 151 yards and passed for 235 to total 386 total yards.

## Game No. 9 Louisville 38, No. 24/21 West Virginia 35

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. - (Nov. 5, 2011) -Louisville won for the first time in Morgantown since 1990 and broke a four-game losing streak to West Virginia with a 38-35 victory over the Mountaineers.

Two fumbles and special teams miscues proved too much for West Virginia to overcome, even though the warm, sunny November day started off brightly for the Mountaineers.

Brad Starks returned the game's opening kickoff 62 yards to the Louisville 30-yard line to set up the game's first score. Three plays later, WVU quarterback Geno Smith hit receiver Tayon Austin for a 25-yard scoring toss and a 7-0 lead.

However, it took Louisville just 2:38 to answer, as the Cardinals marched 73 yards to tie the game on Jeremy Wright's eight-yard run. The scoring drive was highlighted by a 55-yard run by tailback Dominique Brown.

Louisville took its first lead of the game with 5:44 left in the first on Senorise Perry's 13-yard run that ended a 78-yard drive. A 37-yard completion from quarterback Teddy Bridgewater to Eli Rogers provided the spark for the Cardinals.

The Mountaineers tied the game at 14-14 at the 12:18 mark of the second quarter, when Stedman Bailey hauled in a five-yard pass from Smith, as the Mountaineers drove 76 yards for their second

West Virginia recaptured the lead with 5:44 left in the first half, when Shawne Alston powered through for a two-yard scoring run, and a 21-14 WVU lead.

But Louisville was able to tie the game at the half, taking advantage of an 11-yard shanked punt by the Mountaineers. Six plays later, the game was tied at 21-21, when Bridgewater connected with Rogers.

The Mountaineers intercepted Bridgewater on the opening possession of the third quarter, but could not come away with any points, as Tyler Bitancurt missed a 32-yard field goal.

Later, the Cardinals put up the only points in the third quarter, when kicker Chris Philpott converted on a 39-yard field goal, as Louisville regained the lead for good at 24-21.

West Virginia mounted a drive late in the third, but was stopped at the Cardinal six-yard line as the third quarter ended. To start the fourth, Bitancurt's 23-yard field goal to tie was blocked and returned 82 yards for a touchdown by Andrew Johnson. Instead of the game being tied, West Virginia found itself down, 31-21, with 14:42 left in

Two possessions later, the Mountaineers closed the gap to 31-28, when Alston rushed in from seven-yards out to end an impressive 96-yard. eight-play drive that was aided by a 46-yard

completion from Smith to receiver Ivan McCartney.

Trailing by three with 8:53 left, the Mountaineers needed a stop on defense and could not get one. The Cardinals converted on third-andseven and fourth-and-one to keep the ball for 7:11, resulting in a three-yard touchdown run by Brown and a 38-28 margin.

WVU added a score late, when Smith found Bailey in the corner of the end zone, but the Cardinals recovered the onside kick to end any comeback hopes.

Smith finished with 410 yards passing, as Bailey (118 Yards) and Austin (90 yards) were his favorite targets. Darwin Cook led the defense with 10 stops. Bruce Irvin had a game-high two sacks and three TFL's.

For the Cardinals, Bridgewater passed for 246 yards, while Brown rushed for 69 and Rogers had 69 yards receiving. Hakeem Smith led the defense with 10 tackles.

The Mountaineers rushed for 123 yards and passed for 410 to total 533 yards of offense. The Cardinals finished with 105 yards on the ground and 246 via the pass for 351 yards of total of-

## Game No. 10 West Virginia 24, No. 23/18 Cincinnati 21

**CINCINNATI, OHIO** - (**Nov. 12, 2011**) - West Virginia earned a road victory over a ranked opponent the hard way with a thrilling 24-21 win over Cincinnati in Paul Brown Stadium.

The Mountaineers trailed early, made a comeback to take the lead, only to relinquish it to a furious Cincinnati rally, before holding on at the end thanks to a blocked field goal attempt for their seventh victory of the season and third in BIG EAST play.

The Bearcats looked strong early, forcing West Virginia's offense out on downs. UC then scored the game's first touchdown in just three plays, when Isaiah Pead broke loose for a 40-yard touchdown run.

To West Virginia's credit, the Mountaineers never panicked and quieted the Bearcat faithful four plays later with a 59-yard touchdown bomb from quarterback Geno Smith to Stedman Bailey to tie the game at 7-7, with 11:37 left in the opening quarter.

Both defenses held until the 9:35 mark of the second quarter, when West Virginia put together an II-play, 72-yard drive that ended with a 28-yard Tyler Bitancurt field goal. The WVU scoring drive was highlighted by pass completions of 39 and 21 yards from Smith to receiver Tavon Austin.

With West Virginia leading 10-7, a game-changing play by the Mountaineer defense altered the Cincinnati game plan. Bearcat senior quarterback Zach Collaros was sacked by WVU's Bruce Irvin and fumbled the ball in the end zone, before it was recovered by Julian Miller for a Mountaineer touchdown and a 17-7 lead.

More importantly though, Collaros suffered a broken ankle on the play, forcing backup quarter-back Munchie Legaux into action. While the West Virginia offense could not put any more points on the board in the first half, the West Virginia defense returned the favor on the Bearcats, enabling the Mountaineers to take the 10-point lead into the locker room.

After keeping the fleet-footed Legaux in-check from the middle of the second quarter to the midway point of the third, the backup broke loose at the 8:48 mark of the third for a 65-yard run, but a missed field goal kept the Bearcats off the board

Legaux was at it again on Cincy's next possession, as he connected with Pead for a 45-yard pass play and then took it in himself from seven-yards out, cutting the WVU lead to 17-14 with 4:19 left in the third.

Cincinnati took advantage of a WVU fumble to take the lead early in the fourth on a 10-yard run by Pead.

Trailing for the first time since the opening minutes, WVU started a 12-play, 74-yard drive with

13:13 left in the game and retook the lead at the 8:46 mark on a one-yard plunge by Shawne Alston. WVU converted two crucial third down long-yardage plays to keep the drive alive.

The WVU defense held Cincy scoreless on two straight possessions, before the Bearcats got one last chance with 2:01 left. UC got to the WVU 14-yard line with two ticks left, but Tony Miliano's 31-yard attempt was blocked by Eain Smith to save the day for the Mountaineers.

The game was about as even as it could get as both teams totaled 404 yards of total offense. West Virginia managed 32 yards on the ground and 372 in the air, while the Bearcats finished with a balanced 190 yards on the ground and 214 passing.

Smith passed for 372 yards and had two 100yard receivers in Austin and Bailey. Linebacker Najee Goode paced the defense with eight tackles. Pead topped the Bearcat numbers with 113 yards rushing and 67 receiving, while JK Schaffer had nine tackles.

The win gave the Mountaineers a two-game winning streak in the series with Cincinnati.

## Game No. 11 No. 23 West Virginia 21, Pitt 20

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. - (Nov. 25, 2011) - Just like previous "Backyard Brawls," the 104th edition went right down to the end, with West Virginia overcoming a 14-point deficit to daim a 21-20 victory in front of a sellout crowd of 60,932 at Milan Puskar Stadium.

Pitt opened up the scoring by taking advantage of West Virginia miscues and penalties. The Mountaineers had the Panthers stopped after a Kevin Harper missed field goal, but a personal foul penalty gave Pitt new life. The Panthers went on to complete a 13-play, 71-yard drive that ended with a Zach Brown one-yard rush, and a 7-0 Pitt lead.

The Panthers extended their margin to 14-0 with 2:14 left in the opening quarter, when Isaac Bennett motored in from six-yards out, giving the Panthers two scores in three drives to start the game.

West Virginia closed the gap to 14-7 with 7:23 left in the first half, when quarterback Geno Smith connected with receiver Stedman Bailey for a 63-yard scoring play.

After stopping Pitt on its next possession, West Virginia fumbled the ensuing punt, which was recovered by Pitt at the WVU 33-yard line. Five plays later, the Panthers made the Mountaineers pay for the miscue by adding a 30-yard Harper field goal for a 17-7 advantage.

West Virginia did manage a Darwin Cook interception just before halftime, but the Mountaineer offense could not move the ball, and the Panthers took the 10-point lead into the locker room at the half.

Pitt got the ball to start the second half, and the Mountaineer defense held once again, but another fumbled punt by the Mountaineers put the Panthers back in business at the WVU 16-yard line

A strong defensive stand forced the Panthers into a 27-yard field goal by Harper, and their lead was upped to 20-7 with 11:29 left in the third.

The Mountaineers answered the score with their second touchdown, by putting together a seven-play, 60-yard drive. Running back Shawne Alston pulled the Mountaineers to within six at 20-14 on his eight-yard scoring run at the 8:52 mark of the third.

An impressive defensive effort continued to keep the Mountaineers in the game, as the unit only allowed Pitt 80 yards in the second half and no drive longer than 23 yards over the final two quarters.

West Virginia took its first lead of the game with 6:04 left, when the Mountaineers completed an 83-yard drive on Alston's one-yard run for a 21-20 WVU lead.

From there, the West Virginia defense did the

rest, coming up with 10 sacks in the game, including nine on Pitt's final 25 plays to hold the Panthers scoreless on their final two possessions to secure the come-from-behind win.

Smith passed for 244 yards, with 102 yards going to Tavon Austin and 80 to Bailey. Julian Miller led the defense with 12 tackles and four sacks. Punter Corey Smith also played a key role in turning the field with his four punts for an average of 57.2 yards, including a long punt for 62 yards.

Pitt got a combined 136 yards rushing from Bennett and

Brown, while Tino Sunseri passed for 137 yards. Buddy Jackson and Max Gruder led the Panther defense with eight tackles each.

Final totals showed WVU with 113 yards rushing and 244 passing for 357 yards of offense. Pitt totaled 159 yards on the ground and 137 through the air for 296 total yards.

## Game No. 12 No. 22/20 West Virginia 30, USF 27

**TAMPA, Fla.** - (**Dec. 1, 2011**) - Tyler Bitancurt's 28-yard field goal as time expired gave West Virginia its sixth BIG EAST championship in nine years, and seventh overall, as the Mountaineers defeated South Florida, 30-27, before a Thursday night ESPN national audience.

The dramatic victory saw West Virginia control the game for three quarters, only to fall behind in the fourth, before staging the all-important comeback.

The field goal was the second game-winning kick as time expired for Bitancurt in three years, but this one came on the road and was good enough for a conference championship, and a nine-win regular season.

The dramatics for both teams came in the fourth quarter. West Virginia led for three and a half quarters thanks in part to a solid defensive effort and strong special teams.

The Mountaineers first score came at the 13:29 mark of the second quarter. By taking advantage of a blocked punt, WVU went up 3-0 on Bitancurt's 23-yard field goal.

West Virginia extended it's lead to 10-0 at the 8:29 mark, when cornerback Pat Miller intercepted USF quarterback B.J. Daniels for a 52-yard touchdown return.

The Bulls got on the scoreboard with 5:13 left in the first half, when Daniels connected with receiver Sterling Griffin for a 20-yard pass play. The play was originally ruled an incomplete pass, but replay overturned the call, and the Bulls had the 10-play, 80-yard drive in the books.

The Mountaineers added a second Bitancurt field goal with just 22 seconds remaining in the half. The drive was aided by a 20-yard run from quarterback Geno Smith to put Bitancurt in range for the 42-yarder.

West Virginia took the opening drive of the second half and moved deep into USF territory, but came away empty after fumbling on the Bull's three-yard line.

The fumble recovery sparked USF, who then marched 82 yards in 10 plays and closed the gap to 13-10, after Maikon Bonani converted a 32-yard field goal.

On the ensuing kickoff, WVU's special teams came up big once again as Tavon Austin returned the kick 90 yards for a score, and a 20-10 Mountaineer lead. The kickoff return was Austin's second of the season and third of his career.

The Bulls added a field goal late in the third to pull within 20-13, setting up fourth quarter fireworks for both teams.

A 15-play, 72-yard drive enabled the Bulls to tie the game with 10:01 left on Daniels' one-yard rush. Then USF took its first and only lead on WVU's next possession, when Smith was inter-

cepted by JaQuez Jenkins for the pick six from 24 yards away, and a 27-20 lead.


With USF seemingly in control, the Mountaineers answered with an 11-play drive that covered 77 yards and ended with Dustin Garrison's fiveyard rush to tie the game at 27.

USF marched deep into WVU territory and seemed ready for the go-ahead score, when WVU linebacker Najee Goode forced a Daniels fumble, that was recovered by teammate Doug Rigg at the WVU 28-yard line.

Now it was West Virginia's turn to win the game, and aided by five plays of nine yards or more, along with a 26-yard completion on fourth and 10 from Smith to receiver Stedman Bailey, the WVU offense gave Bitancurt the chance, and he seized it.

Final totals showed West Virginia with 127 yards rushing and 237 passing for 364 total yards. USF totaled 171 yards on the ground and 226 in the air for 397 yards of offense.

The victory gave West Virginia nine or more wins for the seventh straight season, and also at least a five-win conference mark for the seventh straight year.
